Alcester Town Council have set up a Working Group to examine the potential future use of the Greig Memorial Hall once it comes back into public ownership. The Working Group is focused on ensuring a viable long-term future for the Memorial Hall including community use. As the Hall has been closed for the past seven years, it is accepted that significant work will be needed to restore it to full use and this will be considered when assessing any expressions of interest.



Community groups and organisations are encouraged to come forward to give their proposals on how they wish to see the Hall used. All submissions will be carefully considered, however must take into account the financial requirements of the operation of the Hall. Opportunities for grant and public funding will also be part of the work undertaken by the Working Group.

Clerk's Corner

Precept information for Alcester council tax payers

The Town Council sets the precept each year in January. The precept is the primary source of income for the Town Council and is part of the Council Tax which residents pay to Stratford-on-Avon District Council. The Town Council only receives a very small proportion of the Council Tax. In 2017-18 Band D council tax payers in Alcester paid £1,740.68 in Council Tax of which only £114.11 was paid to the Town Council. The Town Council does not receive any direct funding from central government.

At the Full Council meeting on 9 January 2018, the Town Council agreed to request a precept of £250,746 from Stratford on Avon District Council for the year 2018-19. The precept in 2017-18 was £240,756. The Council has increased its total expenditure budget by 2% for the forthcoming year.

This increase is required to cover the statutory increase in the minimum wage in April 2018, anticipated rises in local government salary scales, reduction in the Council Tax support grant previously received from Stratford-on-Avon District Council and additional costs connected with data protection which will come into effect in May 2018. In addition, inflation is anticipated to be in the region of 3% in 2018 which will increase running costs generally. The agreed precept will result in a small increase in the precept charge to Alcester residents (Band D) from £114.11 to £116.34 per annum. This rise of £2.23 per Band 'D' property is equivalent to 4 pence per week.

The Town Council uses the precept to run council business and to provide a range of services to residents. These include four allotment sites, four playgrounds, the cemetery on Birmingham Road, civic and community events, grants to voluntary organisations, maintenance and upkeep of the Jubilee Centre, the Alcester Green River Corridor, the recreation ground on Stratford Road and miscellaneous street furniture such as signs, benches and bins.

Many of these do not generate any income and need regular re-investment to enable them to remain an asset for the community.

With ever increasing budgetary pressures on County and District Councils over the coming few years town and parish councils will be asked to take on additional responsibility for some of the non-statutory services they currently operate. The Town Council is charged with getting more for less, while maintaining and improving, the services provided to the town. The handing over of some additional areas of responsibility is inevitable and beyond the Town Council's control.

There has only been a low level of activity over the last period, only significant issues are highlighted.

Meeting 18/01/2018

17/03089/FUL- SIG Roofspace Alcester Heath Alcester B49 5JG. Proposed: New side extension to northern elevation of principal building and variation of condition 2 attached to planning permission reference 17/00756/VARY to state' The premises hereby approved shall not operate outside the hours: 0600 - 2300 Monday to Friday and 0600-1300 hours Saturday. There shall be no movement of materials within the areas of storage shown on drawing reference RS-F-EXT- Storage-01-RevF, including any movement of materials onto or off racking and storage areas hereby approved outside of the hours 0600-2100 hours Monday to Friday and 0700-1300 hours Saturday.

Public representation was made at the meeting. Concern was expressed regarding the proposed extended hours and associated noise, lighting impact on nearby residents, traffic movement in and out of the site-"lorry parking" on A435. In addition, concern also remains about inadequate landscaping. A holding **OBJECTION** was lodged pending a site visit (see below for further submission).

COMMUNITY CARE

Alcester Health and Well-Being Board

The Board continues to meet with colleagues from statutory and voluntary organisations across the county. Taking a steer from WCC Health and Well-Being Strategy, we aim to represent and champion the health and well-being of Alcester residents. The new Alcester Directory (see below) dramatically demonstrates how many activities and organisations there are to join. In the last eighteen months, working with other groups as well as establishing new activities like Elderberries, our initial priority of working with older people is proving very successful. Our local demographics highlight the need for continuing work with older people and to address the issue of loneliness.

We have now agreed that we are in a position to consider working with other priority groups. The two we have identified are: Mental health and well-being of children and young people (up to 25) and secondly, carers- including young carers. In the weeks and months ahead we will be seeking help and advice from people, especially young people and carers, as to what Alcester needs. We are very keen to assist.

2018 is an important date for Remembrance, as the United Kingdom prepares itself to honour the conclusion of one of the bloodiest conflicts in human history. It's hard to imagine today that only 100 years ago saw the end of a conflict that killed three quarters of a million UK soldiers,

each one of whom gave their life to preserve the freedom and integrity of the nation they served. Every family in Alcester was affected by the Great War, both directly and indirectly, and the significance of those losses continue to be felt today. We must never forget the sacrifices, and always remember the consequences.

The Legion will be remembering the 100th anniversary of the RAF on the 1 April, Armed Forces Day with a Garden Party on 30 June and The Poppy Appeal Launch on the 27 October. Remembrance weekend itself will be packed with opportunities for Alcester to remember and mark this special year: On Saturday morning there will be a re-dedication of the town's War Memorials, followed by a 'Remembrance' Silver Band Concert at St Nicholas Church. Sunday will have it's usual poignant Remembrance Parade and Service, two events so loved and well attended by the Community. However, this year Remembrance Sunday is also the Centenary of the signing of the Armistice between the Allies of World War 1 and Germany. To mark the special nature of the day the community will be invited at dawn to a short ceremony, 'The Battles Over, Sleep in Peace '. Later in the day we will be lighting a beacon as part of the national chain of 1000 beacons to celebrate 'The Battles Over, The Last Post', the conclusion to the acts of remembrance in Alcester.

Alcester's 20mph zone

Some residents may not be aware that Alcester has a 20mph zone covering most of the old town (as you enter the High Street and School Road) and along Kinwarton Road. The zone is there to encourage drivers to keep to speeds below 20mph and protect pedestrians. The majority of pedestrian casualties occur in built up areas: 29 of the 34 child pedestrians and 302 of the 413 adult pedestrians who were killed in 2016, died on built-up roads. Pedal cyclists are also vulnerable in built up areas, with over half of cyclist deaths (58 of 102) and most cyclist casualties (16,934 of 18,477) occurring on such roads.

Traffic authorities are being urged to consider the introduction of more 20mph limits and zones, particularly in urban areas and built-up village streets that are primarily residential ensuring greater safety for cyclists and pedestrians. 20mph zones, are designed to be "self-enforcing" due to traffic calming measures which are introduced along with the change in the speed limit. Speed humps, chicanes, road narrowing, planting and other measures are typically used to both physically and visually reinforce the shared nature of the road. Police can prosecute drivers breaking the speed limit. A large number of evaluation studies have demonstrated a link between the introduction of 20mph zones and a subsequent reduction in casualties. There is similarly strong evidence showing the benefits of traffic calming measures, which are used in 20mph zones. As well as road safety benefits, it is important to highlight the contribution that 20mph zones can have in encouraging more physical activity, such as walking and cycling, by contributing towards a safer environment. The money spent on the schemes can also greatly improve the character of a residential area and quality of life for residents.

Is it a secure connection? Web pages where you enter personal or financial details into should display a locked padlock sign and have a web address that starts with https. This means your connection to the website is secure. 3. Phishing. Don't click on links or attachments within unsolicited emails. 4. Bank Transfers. Online auction sites. Don't pay for goods or services by bank

transfer unless you know and trust the person. Payments via bank transfer offer you no protection if you become a victim of fraud.
