Developing Alcester's Neighbourhood Plan

A new Steering Group, chaired by Wendy Mills, has been set up to develop Alcester's Neighbourhood Plan. Consisting of residents, town councillors and business representatives, all passionate about Alcester, they are organised into working groups to develop policies relating to the local Economy, Housing and other building, Community Facilities, Transport and Infrastructure, and our Natural Environment.

The Neighbourhood Plan area covers the parish of Alcester. It will look to the future and create policies which will cover up to 2031. There is a laid down process to follow and before the draft plan is approved it will be subject to independent assessment and a local referendum, giving the town's people of Alcester a chance to see it and vote on it. Once it is approved, Stratford District Council will refer to it when considering future changes and deciding on planning applications.

There have already been several surveys and consultations asking townsfolk about what they think are the current issues and changes they want to see. Stratford District Council's Core Strategy has also now been approved. These will be considered as Alcester's Neighbourhood Plan is drafted.

We want to protect our heritage and community whilst allowing incremental development and enhancement of our facilities. Our vision is that Alcester will continue to be a thriving town in which to live and work, and attractive to visitors.

- New Speed Aware volunteers vetted and trained and approximately 15 Speed Watch sessions held around the town
- Youth Council meets regularly and is developing ideas for a cinema club and a café at the Depot
- New emergency equipment purchased with a grant from the Moorfields Charity
- Alcester Directory of local activities created and over 1000 copies distributed

Abbey Site Re-Connected after 450 years

The work on the newly acquired Abbey Fields, at the rear of the Grammar School, continues to improve the access and nature walks available to the community of Alcester.

The latest addition is the provision of a newly constructed footbridge connecting the two halves of the ancient Abbey site.

During the winter months Councillor Mike Gittus set to work with hammer and saw, to re-connect the two halves of this nationally important scheduled monument.

The Abbey was founded in 1138 by the Botellers of Oversley, Warwickshire. The Abbey's many endowments included the Chapel of St James and St Peter, near <u>Shaftesbury</u>, <u>Dorset</u>, and the Manor of Blynfield in the parish of St James, North Dorset, which is known as the 'Manor of Alcester and Bec', together with a number of other churches and estates. Planning Committee 2017-18

Meetings: The Planning Committee met on 18 occasions throughout the year, and considered 88 Planning applications, all of which are minuted (please see the Town Council website). Objections were made on 32 occasions. Site visits were conducted on 6 occasions, and public representation occurred at 10 meetings.

Applications of significance were:

- SIG Roofspace, Alcester Heath: Two applications were submitted, one concerned with changing the height of the storage, and another concerned with changing the layout of the roller shutter doors and increasing time on site. Objection lodged to the first application, but after a site visit, the proposal was agreed. Objection sustained to the second application due to concerns about noise, lighting and landscaping.
- Alcester Members Club, St Faiths Road: Change of use to a mixed use as Members Club with Bed & Breakfast and external works to facilitate the change. Initially an objection was made, but after a visit to a local similar development the proposal was agreed.
- Garages, St Faiths Road: Demolition of existing garage blocks and erection of 4 dwellings (with associated stopping up of highway behind 78- 84 St Faiths Road). Support for the proposal-improvement on the existing site, adequate parking provision and amenity space had been made and the development is in keeping with existing properties.
- White Lion, Evesham Street: An objection was made regarding parking and the new houses on the carepark considered to be overbearing. Following a revised application, which was viewed more favourably, the developers appealed the original decision, and the appeal was granted.
- Rosehill, Priory Road: An objection was made due to the works being progressed without permission. The application went to SDC Planning Committee (West) and the proposal granted permission with conditions.

EQUIPMENT

People in Alcester battling ill health or injury are being urged to apply for financial assistance. The call comes from the WPH Charitable Trust – a body of trustees made up of medical and non-medical professionals – which distributes some £250,000 of financial aid every year. Individuals and organisations who work towards preventing, relieving and curing ill health are also among those urged to apply. Grants are also given to community and private projects in the area which aim to improve the lives or quality of life of people battling ill health or injury. Recent grants include £1,500 for a mobility scooter for a 51-year-old mother who would otherwise find it difficult to get out and about, and £2,000 to a 73-year-old pensioner for a stairlift in his own home. Also, £1,500 towards a project teaching people with mental health issues how to cook and eat healthily, and £1,500 towards a recycling social enterprise project which creates volunteering opportunities for people with learning difficulties or disabilities, who may otherwise find it difficult to find employment. The criteria for eligibility for a wide range of needs, from research into new technologies to the provision of equipment for personal need. The Trust supports new buildings for hospitals and schools helping with provision of special educational facilities, disabled funding, and access improvements.

Letter from America.....



TWO ALCESTERS

I was raised on a farm 4 miles outside of Alcester, South Dakota, USA in the 1950/60's. My town had been founded in 1883 as the Chicago & Northwestern RR pushed west and was settled by Scandinavian and German Immigrants. Some of my Swedish great-great grandparents emigrated there in 1879, along with some of their siblings and families before Alcester was a town; they were farming the

land. Prior to that, the area had been inhabited for over 200 years by the Sioux Indians (Native Americans), who pursed a nomadic life following the great buffalo herds of North America. The Sioux had originally lived in the woodlands of Wisconsin and Minnesota, but had been driven from their lands by other tribes which had acquired guns and other modern weapons from the French and English. The Sioux, however, learned the horse culture of the Southern Plains tribes and displaced the Arikara Tribe which had developed an agricultural society on the rolling plains of southeastern South Dakota. It is ironic that the iron horse (trains) of the American farmers displaced the tribe whose horse culture had displaced the tribe of farmers that had originally called my area home.

Between 1890 and 1930, Alcester grew and prospered as the local hub of farming activity as its farm products were sold all over the country. Alcester had two banks, an auditorium for meetings and social events, a hotel, four churches, numerous stores, a movie theatre, a city park with a band stand (well used in the summer months) and both a grammar and high school. Most buildings were originally constructed of wood and the streets were not paved; the population of the town never exceeded 1,000 souls. By the 1960's farming had become more mechanized, and the land more expensive to buy or inherit. The children were more educated and went to college, causing the population to decline as the young adults moved to the cities for employment. Alcester, S.D. went into a modest decline to 440 residents- until the automobile and nearby freeway commuting allowed non-farmers to move to the town to enjoy its friendly culture, civic pride, and quiet lifestyle. Today there is only one bank and a few stores, two restaurants, and the same four churches which are still well attended each Sunday morning. The schools, churches and most of the commercial building have been rebuilt with brick and mortar. The same large, well maintained, tree-shaded Alcester City Park has lost the bandstand; it still has picnic shelters and play areas for children and adults and has added a swimming pool. There is even a 9-hole golf course on the edge of town. Today over 800 people live in Alcester; it is more of a village, in the English sense of the word, than a town.

During a visit to England with my husband in July 2017, we met Julian and Veronica Stapley. They had been to "my" Alcester about 4 years ago. It was so wonderful of them to spend a day with us and bring us to "their" Alcester. It felt so strange to see the town sign outside of Alcester, England, (Julian stopped the car so I could take a photo) having only known until a few years ago of my Alcester, South Dakota. We were immediately impressed by both the age of the town and the vibrancy of the city life. The town center was a hub of activity, with numerous stores and restaurants catering to the local population. Our hosts showed us the Town Hall, with the carved date of 1641 and the seal of Alcester, where social events and civic meetings are still held. We walked around the town center, admiring the half-timbered buildings and the many beautiful flowers in pots and gardens. We admired the Princess Diana Memorial, the clock tower, St Nicholas Church, the red phone booths, the War Memorial, and the Gold Olympic winner statue. We were impressed with the area for a nursing home for retired people- it looked so inviting. It continued to feel surreal as I would see the word "Alcester" on signs as at the barber shop and post office. Outside of one house Julian was telling us how old it was and the current owner overheard the conversation and graciously invited us all inside to show us many special original features. What a treat that was! As we walked around the town, people that Julian or Veronica knew would say "Hello" to them. This is exactly what would happen in my Alcester! I would like to think that my Alcester will still exist in 300 years and that the civic pride of its inhabitants will be as evident as that which I perceived in Alcester, England.

We currently live in a suburb of Portland, Oregon and will be going back to Alcester, S.D. in October. I will be seeing many family members that still live there and am really looking forward to showing them the MANY photos I took of your Alcester. Thank you to Veronica and Julian for an absolutely wonderful day.

"...It was detached from Acacia Ridge and named in 1972, after the main road in the district. (Algester Road) The road's name dates from about 1910 when a local family formed it and gave it the name 'Alcester', after an English town. In 1968, Leighton Properties planned a suburban estate with the proposed name of 'Ridgewood Heights'. Whilst the estate's main access route retains that name, the Queensland Place Names Board, substituted 'Algester' in 1972..."

I close now by thanking you guys for your time and hope to hear from you with any information about who that family might have been. I also sincerely hope that a stronger or more official "brother-sister" bond could be forged between both of communities into the future. Cheers.

Lock Snapping Recently a number of burglaries have taken place locally where the offenders have snapped the door locks to gain entry. This involves breaking the cylinder in two allowing the lock to be manipulated and opened. This will release all the multi locking points around the door. Anti-Snap locks can be fitted to combat this type of crime. We advise you to check to see if your locks are antisnap. There are numerous websites and YouTube videos on this issue.
