

Citizens Advice Outreach to restart Alcester Outreach

As a charity, Citizens Advice South Warwickshire has been faced with trying to do more when it is receiving less in grants to run the service. This is forcing us to only continue with projects that fund themselves and has resulted in the weekly Alcester Outreach service being withdrawn. Other services such as Reach Out and Help (for Crisis situations) and Reach Out to Older People continue to be available in Alcester in addition to Studley and Bidford Outreach and of course, you can reach us at our Stratford-upon-Avon office, by phone (0300 330 1183) or on our website www.casouthwarwickshire.org.uk

CASW has approached a range of local funders, from charitable trusts to parish councils, to fundraise to keep this valuable service running. With further generous support, we will reinstate the service. I hope to have positive news for you in the future about the start date of this service, so that you will be able to access the help you need, when you need it, right on your doorstep.

100 YEARS OF REMEMBRANCE

This year marks another milestone in the history of world warfare.

The 11th of November this year is not only Remembrance Sunday, but also a Century since the conclusion of The Great War. This war was the most bloody conflict in modern times and the scar left is forever marked on the hearts of every family in the nation.

Alcester will be remembering, and giving thanks, to those from within our community who gave everything to keep us free from tyranny and slavery.

The Remembrance Weekend will be a very special time to remember. The Alcester Branch of the Royal British Legion, ably assisted by Alcester Town Council, Alcester Court Leet and Local Voluntary Associations will support a number of events.

- Saturday 10 November will see a re-dedication of the towns' war memorials, along with the dedication of a new memorial on the recently registered Centenary Field. In the evening there will be a Remembrance Concert at St Nicholas Church
- Sunday 11 November will start early, with a lone piper, piping "The Battles O'er, Sleep in Peace" on The Church Green at 6am. The Remembrance and Armistice Parade followed by the Remembrance Service will take place as usual and we anticipate a record attendance this year. At 7pm in the evening, and continuing with the theme of this special day, a short commemoration will take place at the new Centenary Memorial with the lighting of the Centenary Beacon. The Last Post will be performed and finally the Alcester Town Crier will bring a special message to the town.

Further information on the events will be available later in the summer.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Here in the parish of Alcester, Stratford on Avon District Council are the planning authority and as such process all the planning applications and make decisions on each application.

- A brief outline of the process on receipt of a planning application is as follows (fee payable):
- Registration and validation- Application given a unique case reference number
- Consultation- Neighbours, SDC councillors and town/parish council, specialist advisors
- Site visit- By case officer
- Report- By case officer
- Determination- This is done in two ways. For simple applications a senior officer will check the report and make a decision. However, when either the Town Council or the District Councillor have objected to an application and the case officer disagrees (or vice versa), the decision will be referred to Stratford District Council's Planning Committee (West) where the decision will be made. Members of the public are able to make representations at these Committee meetings

Decisions are made within 8- 13 weeks from the date of validation depending on complexity and the applicant notified

- Decision- Approval- The permission lists any conditions applied to make the proposal acceptable. There is usually a fee payable to discharge these
- Decision- Refusal- When an application is refused there is an explanation on the refusal notice
- Appeals- The applicant can appeal to the Planning Inspectorate if an application is refused or imposes a condition they think unjustified

Alcester Town Council is a **statutory consultee** in the planning consultation process. It does not make decisions.

ATC Planning Committee meets fortnightly on a Monday at Globe House to discuss current planning applications and then submits a formal comment to SDC online. Members of the public are very welcome to attend meetings. Agendas are published on the noticeboards and on the Town Council website. Meeting dates are published in the Connection magazine and can also be found on the Town Council website.

If the Planning Committee, or you as a member of the public, would like to object to a planning application there are only certain issues known as 'material considerations' that will be taken into account by SDC. **Material planning considerations can include (but are not limited to):**

- Overlooking/ loss of privacy
- Loss of daylight/ sunlight or overshadowing
- Scale and dominance
- Layout and density of buildings
- Appearance and design of development and materials proposed
- Disabled persons' access
- Highway safety
- Traffic and parking issues
- Community safety and crime prevention
- Drainage and flood risk
- Noise, dust, fumes etc
- Impact on character or appearance of area
- Effect on listed buildings/ conservation areas/ sites of archaeological value
- Effect on trees and wildlife/ nature conservation
- Impact on the community and other services
- Economic impact and sustainability
- Local needs for provision of affordable housing and public open space
- Government policy
- Proposals in the Local Development Plan
- Previous planning decisions (including appeal decisions)

Non-material planning considerations are issues which <u>cannot</u> be taken into account by SDC when deciding on a planning application. Examples are given below:

- · Who the applicant is/ the applicant's background
- Loss of views
- Loss of property value
- Loss of trade or increased competition
- Strength or volume of local opposition
- Construction noise/ disturbance during development
- Fears of damage to property
- Maintenance of property
- Boundary disputes, covenants or other property rights
- Private rights of way
- Private right to light
- Age, health, status, background and work patterns of the objector

A letter from the Chairman; Sarah Bassett

Icester Chamber Time really has flown by since I took the Chair in October 2014 and as of Trade and Commerce an organisation, we have evolved almost beyond recognition. Business to Business memberships were almost non existent and are now some

50 strong and we have new membership enquiries every month. The Autumn and Winter sees free monthly B2B networking events at The Moathouse and these are well attended by members and non members alike. We have a superb website, a healthy following on social media and an opportunity to affiliate with Coventry and Warwickshire Champions. The potential for future growth is excellent as we look forward to 2018/2019.

Since our rather glorious win at the Great British High St awards in 2015, we felt the time had come to look at how we could support the Retail, Tourism and Hospitality sector. With the support of the Warwickshire Towns Network and the town centres team at Warwickshire County Council we created the brand "Visit Alcester", won funding for social media and off line marketing training for our B2C sector businesses, installed free town centre wifi and footfall tracking software, joined the south Warwickshire destination management organisation "Shakespeare's England" and more recently we were awarded funding via the County Councillors grant fund to build a new website that will showcase Alcester as a destination. Currently under construction!

With the support of Alcester Community Trust, the recent Alcester Motor Show was a huge success, bringing in new visitors to the town from a huge geographical area and as such a date of Sunday 21st July has been set for next year.



The Game Fair brings some £30 million to the Warwickshire economy and whilst we don't see huge numbers of their audience visiting the town centre, the

contractors & exhibitors bring valuable extra business to the town and the industrial estate businesses during the build up and break down periods. The information flyer we created was extremely well received and we hope that everyone included saw some benefit. This will also be sent out to the Camper Calling contractors who will be arriving on site in August.

Due to increasing amounts of consultancy, my time is being taken up more and more and therefore, I have decided to split the chamber into two separate organisations. The Alcester Chamber of Trade and Commerce will be a stand alone organisation in support of the Business to Business sector and "Visit Alcester" and "Alcester Motor Show" will sit under an new organisation that will be known as the Alcester Retail: Tourism and Hospitality Partnership.

I intend to step down from Alcester Chamber of Trade and Commerce with effect from the start of the Chamber year 2018/2019 - 1st September 2018 and will then concentrate my efforts on the new partnership. Alcester Town Council are also interested in supporting younger people with mental health issues and a new initiative in currently being developed to help assist young people improve their mental wellbeing.


If there is something that you would like to attend that is not currently available or if you would like to help influence local services for older people or young people



Alcester's Roman Museum

Alcester was founded by the Romans in around AD 47 as a walled fort then became a bustling market town, with streets, temples and workshops. The town has been the subject of numerous archaeological digs and is one of the best understood Roman settlements in the country.

The Roman Alcester Museum opened in 2004 and looks after some of Alcester's Roman heritage. Based in Globe House, it is run by a charitable trust of dedicated volunteers who give their time and considerable expertise to this unique museum.

Roman Alcester offers hands-on visits for schools linked to the National Curriculum Key Stage 2 and in the school holidays the museum supports library activities for all children. This summer the 'Let's make digital discovery' day on the 24th August brought the Roman era right up to date!

Our volunteers can conduct tours of the museum and, by arrangement, guided tours of the town. Volunteers can make presentations to local groups and clubs either at the museum or at local venues. A 'friends of the museum' group called the Centurions arranges talks and trips.

Special events for 2018: On **Saturday, September 8**th, the museum will be holding a 'finds' morning. Residents and visitors can bring in objects to an expert from the museums service to see if they are Roman. Last year an object, uncovered in a resident's garden and used as a bird bath, was found to be a mortarium or ancient Roman pottery kitchen vessel used for grinding.

This year we will also open for the Heritage Open Day on the afternoon of Sunday September 9th.

Opening times: We are open throughout the week, except Tuesday, from 9.30 to 5.30pm and open on a Saturday from 10 am to 4pm.

Abbey Fields, Green River Corridor

This Town Council project continues to move forward, and it is pleasing to see the footways establishing themselves over the entire site, linking Priory Meadow to the Nature Reserve, Jubilee Fields, Allotments and Cemetery.

The historic importance of the Abbey site continues to excite and engage the community, and many questions remain unanswered.





One such question relates to the archaeological digs that took place in the late 1930's at the rear of the Grammar School. There was considerable evidence of the medieval structure of the Abbey revealed by the dig, along with a number of stone coffins and artefacts. All these important works and finds were destroyed during the second world war during the blitz on Birmingham. The important location of the archaeology has been lost, and Alcester Town Council hopes that there are members of the community who may remember the dig taking place.

Warwickshire Police Advice- Keep safe from burglary

W.I.D.E. By following the simple guidelines of W.I.D.E you can reduce the opportunities of your home becoming a target of a burglar.

W – Window Locks Fit key-operated window locks to all downstairs windows, windows that can't be seen from the street and easily accessible upstairs windows, e.g. those above a flat roof or near a drainpipe. Locks should conform to British Standard BS7950 or EU equivalent.

I – Internal Lights Table / standard lamps should be placed on timer switches in different rooms around the house. Set them to come on go off at different times to give the impression that the house is occupied. You could also use a timer switch on a radio.

D – **Doors Locks & Bolts** External doors should be fitted with good quality locks which comply with British Standard BS3621 or EU equivalent and use them.

E – External Lights On Sensors External lights should be fitted with sensors. Dusk to dawn lights with low energy bulbs can be more effective as a deterrent than motion sensor controlled lighting. These should be fitted at the front and rear of your home to maximise your security.

Protecting Individual Items Remember you can protect individual items within your property by marking them (see property marking fact sheet for more details).

Warwickshire Police advise that overnight, valuable items, such as car keys, are:

not left in locks

• not kept in plain view (but should be kept downstairs, out of sight. e.g. in a drawer).

Tell Us Once

TELL US ONCE

Tell Us Once is a service offered by most local authorities on behalf of the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP).

The service allows a bereaved person to inform central and local government services of the death at one time rather than having to write, telephone or even attend each service individually.

The Tell Us Once service can save a great deal of time and effort.

It is essential to note that you must have registered the death and been given the unique Tell Us Once reference number before you can use the telephone or online service. See <u>www.gov.uk</u> for further information
