MAYOR'S MESSAGE



It is a huge honour and privilege to have been elected Mayor of Alcester by my fellow Town Councillors on 4 May 2021. With Mark, my husband and Consort, we are very excited as we look ahead to a year of hope and recovery for our very special town.

I must truly thank Councillor Gill Forman for her commitment and dedication in serving as Mayor for the past two years, the last of which has of course been extremely challenging. She has done an amazing job. Congratulations also to her husband Councillor Tim Forman, who has been elected as Deputy Mayor for this year.

There is a great tradition of civic office in the Cargill family, but one that I never had the faintest idea that I would one day continue. When I first came to Alcester in 1986 I was greatly impressed by the community spirit in the town and the fact that everyone seemed to know Mark and his parents! His

father David had been Chairman of Alcester Rural District Council, and when we married in 1988 at St Nicholas Church, my new mother-in-law Marion was serving as the first Mayor of Alcester.

Alcester, as everywhere, has been through a very difficult year and a half, with a massive impact on people's mental and physical health and on the health of many of our local businesses. This has been a hugely challenging time for us all, but what an incredible and heartwarming response we have seen from so many of our residents, helping others at a time of unprecedented need. We have seen our key workers – health, shop and postal workers, school staff, refuse collectors (to name just a few) – continue with their service at a time of significant danger to their own wellbeing. And we have seen an awesome spirit of resilience from our community volunteers, banding together to do whatever they could for our more vulnerable residents. What an amazing community we have!

And it is that amazing community that I know will now mobilise to meet the challenges ahead. The Town Council's Health and Wellbeing projects are restarting, with the addition of our latest project called Alcester – Get a Move On! – outside exercise classes for the over 60's. We also have a new initiative to help our local businesses get busy once again. Totally Locally is an online platform providing essentially a virtual high street, where our shops and other businesses can display and sell their goods, advertise their services and publicise events. Alcester Town Council has provided the start-up funding for this project, to help our businesses recover as we emerge from the pandemic. This is a great opportunity for our high street to come back stronger than ever.


As Chair of the Council's Community Care Committee for the last four years, I have been very involved with the many innovative projects initiated under the Town Council's Health and Wellbeing agenda. For my Mayor's charity I will be working with Marathon Kids UK and Alcester Academy to deliver a new project for the town. The aim is to help teenagers improve their mental and physical wellbeing by building their own programme of physical activities that they want to do. And then of course there is the Greig Hall. What a great positive news story that Alcester Town Council has finally taken ownership of the hall, and one that has been greeted with tremendous enthusiasm by our community! This is going to be a challenging year, but also an exciting year and I am really looking forward to it!

SUCCESS! ALCESTER HAS A NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN!


I'm delighted that at the local referendum held on 6 May 2021, Alcester's residents voted that they wanted Stratford on Avon District Council (SDC) to use our Alcester Neighbourhood Plan to help it decide planning applications, from now until 2031.

This was the culmination of several years' work creating a plan which contains policies based on the feedback of local residents, businesses and landowners. It will help to ensure that Alcester remains a wonderful town in which to live, work and for tourists to visit.

My thanks to everyone who contributed to the plan. This includes members of the Steering Group, the Town Clerk and her team, and the Alcestrians who took part in questionnaires and consultations thus helping to ensure that the policies reflect what they think is important.

Finally, my thanks to all who voted in favour at the referendum.

PLANNING MATTERS - UPDATE

During March and April, the Planning Committee were consulted on 24 planning applications and held three meetings via ZOOM with some of those applications considered via email in the intervening period. There were no objections to the majority of applications; however, an OBJECTION on 21/01065/FUL Alcester Rugby Football Club (retrospective) was agreed because the canopy is considered inappropriate in this setting, causing harm to the Green Belt.

Amendment application 20/01587/FUL Broad Lane Caravans Kings Coughton Alcester B49 5QD was considered and a decision of HOLDING OBJECTION was submitted because the committee was not in possession of all relevant reports and responses and therefore unable to fully scrutinise the application.

A HOLDING OBJECTION for 21/01149/TREE Red Horse House Henley Street Alcester, was agreed 'pending better quality photographic evidence.'

On 26 April, the Planning Committee considered Amendment 17/01087/REM - Land South of Allimore Lane. Three members of the committee declared an interest in this application and withdrew from the meeting. This application was then considered by the remaining members of the committee. A decision was reached to submit a HOLDING OBJECTION subject to the resolution of drainage issues and other matters noted in the response to SDC (Stratford on Avon District Council).

The committee were notified by SDC on 15 planning decisions, notably amongst them were: 20/0050/FUL St Benedicts RC High School Alcester- Retention of modular classroom- Permission with conditions.

20/03344/FUL & 20/03345/LBC The Swan- Permission with conditions.

20/03475/ADV - Waitrose signage, Consent with conditions.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

This will be my final newsletter as your past County Councillor for Alcester Division having proudly served you for the past four years. County Councillor Piers Daniell having been duly elected on 6 May 2021. The pandemic has taught us a great deal about ourselves and our society. We have lost loved ones, but

the community spirit demonstrated during the pandemic has been truly remarkable. We must not lose sight of that.

Both Stratford and Warwickshire authorities were adversely impacted financially by the pandemic with Stratford being the fourth hardest hit local authority in the country. This year's budgets however focused on recovery and growth. The goal is to recover as quickly as possible to the position held in 2019 as being one of the top performing Districts in the West Midlands.

To do this we need our businesses to both recover and grow. Over £40m in Government business support grants were provided in the last year, but even then, some businesses sadly failed, and jobs were lost. Alongside that we have seen a number of business start-ups which the new WCC grants are aimed at helping grow and thrive. With the optimism generated by the huge success of the vaccination programme, loosening of restrictions and the potential for economic growth we should all be looking to a positive future.

NEW BOOK KEPT ALCESTER MALE VOICE CHOIR IN TOUCH DURING LOCKDOWN

The arts have been hit particularly hard during the pandemic, with organisations both professional and amateur no longer able to perform. Within the restrictions put in place to stop the spread of Covid-19 in March last year, was a ban on singing. This came as a blow to the Alcester Male Voice choir with 46 years of singing coming to an abrupt halt.



The ban set Judith Land BEM, Alcester Males Voice Choir's Founder and Director of music thinking of ways to keep members in touch with each other. One of the ideas Judith came up with was the publication of a book which contains a collection of witty anecdotes, cherished memories, illustrations, photographs, poems and songs, all submitted by choir members their families and friends. The book also incorporates a photographic history of the choir together with listings of all members both past and present.

Judith commented, "I have never published a book before, so it presented a challenge for me. But as expected, the choir members rallied to my call with enthusiasm and I am delighted with the finished product. The book will also serve as a permanent reminder of one of the most challenging periods



OVERSLEY GREEN'S COVID YEAR

As the pandemic hit, the residents of Oversley Green took it upon themselves to try and create a bit of cheer with events and projects to lift the spirit.



Oversley Green Festive Walk of Lights and Santa's Grotto. December saw our 'Light up Oversley' Xmas lights campaign with almost three quarters of the houses contributing. This was followed by the 'Christmas Grotto' with a resident's garage converted into a magnificent Santa's Grotto. 300 people came over 4 days to shout out their Christmas lists to a jovially distanced Santa, who duly wrote them all down. It was a very joyful event at a very unjoyful time!

Reflection Area - During January and February OGRA committee members revamped the area by the bench at Oversley Farm, by creating a 'Reflection area'. Two small flowerbeds were created with

snowdrops and cyclamen planted around the tree and small shrubs planted against the fence. We are not sure if the public like it but the rabbits have certainly given their vote of approval!

Mallards' Creek - During this time a small area along the public footpath opposite the farm was also cleared. Two small benches were constructed from recycled wood, 4 bird boxes were erected and the stream area was



cleaned out. Two mallards landed in the stream as it was being cleared and the area immediately became 'Mallards' Creek'.

Hedgehogs As hedgehogs are critically endangered, we have tried to make the area 'Hedgehog Friendly' with a number of signs to ask drivers to take care. A small 'watering hole' has been created at the 'Reflection Bench' and many residents have provided hedgehog



houses and food. There is a lot of hedgehog activity in the area and we are hoping for a new generation of 'hoglets'.

Covid 19 secure – using PPE, screens and social distancing

DID YOU KNOW?

E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs) and are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements such as MOT, licensing, tax and insurance. As e-scooters do not have number plates, signalling ability and don't always have visible rear lights, they cannot be used legally on the roads. E-scooters must therefore be kept on private land. Some parts of the country are taking part in government trials for e-scooter hire with a view to making them legal to use on the roads. Warwickshire is not currently part of the trials.

Warwickshire County Council and the Police are therefore asking the public not to buy an e-scooter at this current time, and to not ride an e-scooter in a public place. Protect Your Car : Keep it Locked, Lit and Empty

Most car crimes happen because cars are left unlocked and both new and old cars are at risk. The good news is that there are simple steps everyone can take to help reduce the risk. Police say that there is only a 46% recovery rate and are reminding everyone to leave their

car locked, lit and empty."

Leave your car: 1. **Locked**: A simple mistake that can prove calamitous: 44% of cars are broken into via an unlocked door.

Lit: 80% of car crime occurs during the evening or at night. Park near street lamps or in a busy area.
Empty: Owners often forget that personal belongings are at as much risk of being stolen as the car itself. Car thieves are opportunists. Leaving items on a car seat or forgetting to lock your car can act as an invitation for crime. Double-check where and how you've parked your car with Locked, Lit and Empty.

Scams- Key signs to spot a Fake

 Official text messages will contain the name of the organisation eg NHS, Vodafone. If the text shows it is from another mobile number but claims to be from an organisation, then report and delete immediately.
If website links look slightly different from normal, eg, Royal Mail's website is royalmail.com, the scam website may be royal.mail.com. Use google to find out official website address.

3. If you are asked to provide your account number and the long number on your bank card, it is a red flag.

4. Never feel pressurised. If you are told you have a limited time to respond, it is another red flag. For suspicious emails- forward to <u>report@phishing.gov.uk</u>.

Suspicious text messages can be sent to 7726 which spells SPAM on keyboard and is free of charge. Anyone who has provided personal information should tell their bank and report to Action Fraud (see below).
