## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

It is hard to know where the last three months have gone! Life in Alcester is gradually returning to something like normal, and that brings back many of our favourite events that mark the year's passing. In September I was able to hold my Civic Service at St Nicholas and I was delighted to welcome many Mayors and Chairs from neighbouring parishes and counties to Alcester. The mop was also able to return,



as was the Alcester 10k run and the Rotary Big Breakfast. In September, Alcester British Legion held a 100 years rededication ceremony for the town's war memorial, now resplendent after a longplanned clean (see photo- left).

I have been able to attend a number of charity events hosted by other civic heads. The Proms in the Park at Learnington was held by Learnington British Legion. Sitting in the park on a sunny afternoon listening to the band, the difficulties of the preceding months began to fade away. I also particularly enjoyed a guided historical tour of St. Mary's Collegiate Church in Warwick, at the invitation of the Mayor of Warwick. This landmark church has a long and splendid history. There is also an interesting connection with Alcester. We of course have Sir Fulke Greville's tomb here in St Nicholas church. At St. Mary's there is a Greville family crypt housing all his illustrious descendants.

In October we welcomed the High Sheriff to Alcester, for a 'pit stop' on her five-day charity bike ride around Warwickshire to highlight local businesses and voluntary organisations (see photo below). We were

able to offer her refreshments and a sunny afternoon. I gather that she was far less fortunate on the remaining days of her tour! Also in October, Cllr Gill Forman and I were invited to give a presentation to Alcester Mothers' Union on the work of the Town Council and the role of the Mayor. We found there was so much to talk about that we actually overran our allotted time! Our talk was very well received, with many people surprised at the scope and variety of our work and projects.

You will hopefully have seen that the scaffolding has come down at the Greig Hall, as work on the roof nears completion. The next jobs are mainly inside, with the installation of insulation and replacement electrics. Various fundraising events are happening, and you will probably have seen the amazing news that the Friends of the Greig have now raised a staggering £100,000! We are also planning the first event at the hall itself in many years, although much of it will, for obvious reasons, be happening outside. On Saturday 4 December there will be a Welcome Back Alcester Christmas Fayre at the Hall, with live music, hot food, Santa's



Grotto and Christmas gift stalls. It will be on for much of the day, so do please come along if you can and join in the fun.

Alcester Town Council is a member of the Stratford District CCTV ☆ Partnership Forum which manages the CCTV cameras in public areas of ☆ the town. The Town Council contributes £5000 a year towards the CCTV ☆ coverage of Alcester. The monitoring of all cameras, 24 hours a day, seven ☆ days a week, is carried out from one location- the Stratford-on-Avon District ☆ Council CCTV Control Room. ☆

All of the cameras and the control room have recently been upgraded guaranteeing high quality pictures that are admissible in court as evidence. All staff work a rotating shift pattern ensuring optimum cover at peak times. CCTV staff have a direct radio link with the Warwickshire Police force control room and officers on the ground.

Footage of incidents is routinely made available to the police for use in the investigation of reported crimes, missing persons or suspect activity and is

used to assist in the prosecution of offenders in the courts. Recent successes in Alcester include one incident where CCTV operators managed to locate a person with dementia who had gone missing. This person was quickly found and returned to their carers. On another occasion a male believed to be wanted and who was missing was located using the CCTV cameras.

## ALCESTER WELCOMES NEW TOWN COUNCILLOR



Cllr Wendy Mills was co-opted in October 2021 as a town councillor for Alcester Oversley ward.

Wendy is Alcester born and bred, having attended Alcester schools and lived here for many years so the town is dear to her heart. She is married to John, who was Alcester Court Leet High Bailiff in 2013, and they have a daughter and two grandsons.

Wendy has seen Alcester grow over the years but it remains a wonderful town with a rich heritage, thriving shops and businesses, lovely green spaces and community spirit. Wendy is a member of several clubs and organisations and is currently a committee member of Alcester and District

Local History Society.

As a Councillor she will try to ensure that Alcester retains its special character. This sentiment was behind the creation of the town's Neighbourhood Development Plan. Wendy was the Chair of the Steering Committee and worked with a team of councillors and residents through many stages to its successful adoption by Stratford District Council in July 2021. This means that decisions on future planning applications will have to take into account policies which local people feel are important.

Nothing stays the same. There will be changes and the town will evolve but Wendy believes this should be sympathetically managed. In her career she has over 20 years' experience of managing change, which included planning, working on and auditing a variety of projects, large and small.

Have you heard about StreetSafe? This is a pilot service for anyone to anonymously tell the Police about public places where they have felt or feel unsafe. ## SANTA RETURNS TO **OVERSLEY!**



In 2018, the members of Alcester Youth Project successfully took on the challenge of raising funds to match a grant from the District Council to replace and refurbish the equipment at the Hopkins Precinct Play area.

## BUSINESS AND TOURISM WORKING GROUP





## ALCESTER WAR MEMORIAL **TOWN HALL- ALL CHANGE!**

The AGM of the War Memorial Town Hall Trust took place on 3 November 2021. It was a well-attended meeting. The object of the Charity is the provision and maintenance of the historic Grade 1 hall in memory of those who gave up their lives in the First World War, for the use of inhabitants of the Town of Alcester. The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and day-to-day management. A dedicated group of people, many of whom are not trustees, carry out all the routine

maintenance tasks and bookings. All have a pride in this ancient hall, which, ultimately belongs to the residents of Alcester.

The last eighteen months and Covid-19 meant the hall could not open in the normal way but, thankfully, the finances are still in good shape. The historic hall would not be the beautiful historic hall it is today without active support from the town. The trustees would welcome residents able to offer skills to help the hall in the future.

After being the Chair for the last four years, Susan Juned stood down. In thanking everyone for their support, she wished all the trustees well in working to ensure the preservation and maintenance of this town hall, on behalf of the community, and wished

them great success for the future. After an election, the current trustees were re-elected and Cllr Gill Forman took over as the new Chair.



## ALCESTER TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB-DAVID TAYLOR MEMORIAL MATCH

Saturday 30 October marked the first anniversary of the loss of our beloved Chairman, Dave Taylor, who passed away on the 22 October 2020 after contracting coronavirus.

Dave had been involved with the advancement of both junior and senior football in Alcester for the past twenty years. Alcester Town FC has grown from having just one junior U14 side in the 1990s to have having 22 sides today (19 youth sides and 3 adult sides).

Dave was on the committee that opened the new 12 acre Stratford Road Ground in Alcester in 2008 and oversaw the refurbishment of the old golf driving range into the great facility we have today. He was also involved in Alcester Town FC becoming a prestigious FA Charter Standard Community Club in 2009.

Dave became the Chairman of Alcester Town FC in 2013 and worked tirelessly for the club up until his

death last year. During his tenure, he saw the first team rise from Division Three of the Stratford Alliance to Division Two of the Midland Football League. In 2020, in honour of his hard work, Dave was awarded the 'Outstanding Contribution to Sport' – the most prestigious award in the Stratford-on-Avon District Community Sports Awards. He was presented with a trophy by the athlete, Iwan Thomas MBE.

The committee responded to a total of 28 planning applications and met by ZOOM on the 5 scheduled dates during the period August through to October, with 21 planning applications presented. The 7 remaining applications arrived outside of those meetings. Because all 7 applications required a response

A resident living within Alcester's Conservation Area attended the meeting held on 2 August. The purpose of their attendance was to provide the committee with an outline of the refurbishment proposals for their property. The committee was pleased to offer advice to the resident on the correct application process for their plan.

I would like to remind residents that all planning meetings are open to the public whether a specific application applies to them personally or you just wish, out of interest, to see how councillors debate the merits of planning matters that impact on the community.

- To report to Full Council on all related matters •

- To assess planning issues from other agencies that may have an impact on Alcester
- To assist with the monitoring of the Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan and housing needs objectives
- To assess market applications and respond with a decision
- To address Alcester Town Council projects which may require planning applications

Rise in burglaries and thefts from motor vehicles in Stratford district. Warwickshire Police are warning people in Stratford district to be vigilant after a rise in

burglary, and theft from motor vehicle incidents in the past few months. As part of their ongoing investigation, they have been carrying out multiple lines of enquiry across the district. If you see anyone acting suspiciously or are a victim of crime, please get in touch by contacting the Police <u>online</u>, calling 101 or 999 if a crime is in progress. Please ensure windows and doors

are locked, all valuables remain out of sight, alarms are set and lights are left on if leaving the house. Vehicles too, should be locked, windows up and no valuables in sight. Park vehicles in a garage where possible, use a steering wheel lock and never leave the keys in the ignition - particularly on cold mornings. Police are committed to locate those who are responsible and are currently looking into a number of lines of enquiry. Many people have commented about this issue on social media. However, Police would ask you to get in touch with them direct using the reporting options available if you spot something that doesn't seem right.



NHS COVID PASS Criminals are sending imitation text messages. emails and making phone calls pretending to be from the NHS. They are offering fake vaccine certificates for sale online and through social media. If you are contacted about your NHS COVID Pass be alert to links and attachments in unexpected text messages or emails, never respond to requests for money, passwords or financial details. Only NHS use the official COVID Pass
