CLERK'S CORNER

Greig Hall funding

At the January Town Council meeting, Councillors agreed to apply for a Public Works Loan Board (PWLB) loan of £100,000 to pay for a new heating system for the Greig Hall. Councillors noted that although £250,000 has already been raised for the renovation work on the Hall, it was essential that the heating system was commissioned at this stage to enable the project to proceed as planned. As required by the PWLB, an online consultation was undertaken and of those who responded 94% supported the loan. Thank you to everyone who responded. An application for the loan has now been submitted to the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities. Precept 2022-23

The Town Council sets the precept each year in January. The precept is the primary source of income for the Town Council and is a small part of the Council Tax which residents pay to Stratford-on-Avon District Council.

At the Full Council meeting on 4 January 2022, the Town Council agreed to request a precept of £306,536 from Stratford-on-Avon District Council for the year 2022-23. The precept in 2021-22 was £286,277.

The agreed precept will result in a small increase in the precept charge to Alcester residents (Band D) from £134.36 to £137.60 per annum. This rise is equivalent to 6 pence per week for a Band D Council Taxpayer.

The Town Council uses the precept to run council business and to provide a range of services to residents. These include four allotment sites, four playgrounds, the cemetery on Birmingham Road, civic and community events such as Remembrance Sunday, grants to voluntary organisations, the Health and Wellbeing projects, maintenance and upkeep of the Eric Payne Community Centre, maintenance of Priory Meadow, Centenary Field and other open spaces and miscellaneous street furniture such as signs, benches and bins.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Work on the integration of services between SDC and WDC continues with all departments having a single head of service. There was a vote by both councils in December that committed them to both a service and political merger. A request has been sent to the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities for permission to merge the two authorities creating South Warwickshire District Council. We are not aware as yet of timescales but we are looking at 2023 or 2024.

A new contract for waste disposal is starting in August this year. This encompasses waste collection from Warwick and Stratford. Part of the new contract includes the purchase of new vehicles. The materials recycling facility at Kineton is very unlikely to reopen following the fire hence we are now taking our recyclate to other sites namely Worcester and London. Needless to say this adds to our costs however we are looking at ways to mitigate these. The new recycling facility is still on schedule to open in April next year. Due to the improvement in recycling (thank you everyone) and reduction in residual waste, a new collection system will be rolled out this year from August. This is the '1-2-3' system. Food waste will be collected each week to go to an anaerobic digester producing methane gas and electricity. (Residents can request a 23 litre caddy). Every 2 weeks Biffa will collect the blue and green bins (green waste collection requires a subscription) and every three weeks will collect the residual waste.

There has been an increase in fly tipping though, sadly, this is a national issue. Although we are affected and still above 2019 levels, we do not have as much fly tipping as many other areas. If you spot any fly tipped rubbish please report it to Street Scene at SDC (<u>streetscene@stratford-dc.gov.uk</u>, 01789 260616) Council tax is due to increase this year by £5, the maximum allowable by Government. For example, this will make the tax payable to SDC £154 for a Band D property. Please note that only just over 7% of the tax collected goes to SDC to run all their services. WCC get 77% with the Police & Crime Commissioner and parishes receiving the rest.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT



Last year I was pleased to be able to award the Councillor Grant of £6,000 to nearly all the worthy causes that applied. These are great causes that we need to support and the following received a share of the funds; Alcester in Bloom, Alcester Hopkins Precinct Play Area Upgrade, Wixford Village Hall, The Depot Youth Club, Cook and Eat your Tea and the Binton Village Hall Renovation.

Many of you continue to contact me with concerns and issues. The vast majority of these related to Highways and the ongoing issues with hedges, roads and

pavements. The team are working hard to clear the backlog of work requests and I am currently managing a list of sixty or so issues that need urgent attention. There is the ability to report these now directly into Warwickshire's system by visiting the ReportIT section of the website either from your PC or phone – <u>www.warwickshire.gov.uk/reportit</u>. In the future you will receive updates when issues have been resolved. Speeding continues to be a big issue for the town and surrounding villages. We have a number of volunteers working on the Speedwatch campaign who you will see in the coming weeks in the area speed checking cars. We are looking at other options such as more 20 mph limits and traffic calming with the use of bollards for the high risk areas.

WARWICKSHIRE SEARCH & RESCUE - LOWLANDS TEAM



Everyone associates rescue with the dramatic work of the RNLI or Mountain Rescue teams. Highly skilled rescuers rushing in life and death conditions to the aid of an injured, stranded or shipwrecked traveller. But they aren't the only teams looking out for us. Would it surprise you to hear that there is a team here in

Warwickshire, not only ready to come to our aid, but frequently tasked by the Police to do so? Lowland Rescue teams do just that. Their primary function is to search for vulnerable missing people.

primary function is to search for vulnerable missing people. Warwickshire Search and Rescue are based in Kenilworth, but have

been on several searches in the Alcester area. Whenever there is a need for the team to deploy there is a family in real distress with someone missing and at risk. Volunteers will leave their homes and jobs in any weather and commit significant time to focused and systematic wide area searches.

Finding the missing person isn't the end of the matter. They train in the skills needed to deal with the needs of the person in whatever state they find them. Utilising First Responders, Advanced and Mental Health first aiders they will look after the casualty and move them to a place of safety where needed until they can hand them over to blue light services.

Criers belonging to the Ancient and Honourable Guild of Town Criers from all over the country are invited to compete at the event to be held on 16 April 2022 (Easter Saturday) at Malt Mill Lane.

The format remains the same with each crier performing two cries, one for their own town and one given to them by the organisers, this year the given cry, being Jubilee Year, is 'HM Queen Elizabeth II'.

Cries are judged by a panel of local judges – Alcester's own Town Crier Dave Parkes is therefore not eligible to compete but will host the event.

Marks are awarded for clarity, diction, volume and inflection. An award is also made for the best dressed crier. The prizes for the competition are sponsored by Alcester Court Leet.

The event commences with a parade from the Town Hall at 12.45pm, and proceeds to Malt Mill Lane where the event gets underway at 1.15pm.

PLANNING MATTERS - UPDATE

Planning Committee members are as follows:

This Planning Committee update covers the period November 2021 to 31 January 2022.

There were five scheduled meetings in this period, one held in person on

15 November with the remainder all held via Zoom. Committee members were asked to respond to 21 planning applications on those occasions plus a further four applications that were received outside these meetings, the latter all dealt with via email response from committee members. The applications were a mixture covering trees, advertising, house extensions, development of wildflower meadow and orchard including construction of a detached dormer bungalow, barn conversion, to name but a few. Representatives of Stansgate Planning attended the 6 December meeting and addressed the committee in respect of Item 4 (a) on the agenda which was planning application 21/03337/REM that referred to land North of Arden Forest Industrial Estate where Cal Gavin Ltd plan to expand their research, development, production, and testing facility. Stansgate representatives also gave a broad overview on the progress at Alcester Employment Park. NEWS FROM ALCESTER YOUTH PROJECT

Alcester Youth Project (AYP), a local community group dedicated to providing opportunities for children of all ages in Alcester, are delighted to announce that the National Lottery have agreed to fund their latest initiative to tackle climate change in Alcester!



The successful grant application to the National Lottery will enable AYP to work with Alcester Town Council, local schools and local wildlife organisations on an

environmental education project on the Abbey Fields in Alcester.

The application for the National Lottery's 'Together for Our Planet' programme was for a programme to help young people promote practical climate action.

The new project will involve preparing an area in the corner of the Abbey Field for school termly events beginning in Autumn 2022. These will involve treeplanting workshops, making bug hotels and bird boxes, soil and worm workshops and bat walk & talk events. Outdoor studies of the plants and wildlife of the site will involve pupils of all ages from many local schools.

AYP committee member and Education consultant Elizabeth Lake said, "We are really looking forward to collaborating with wildlife charities, teachers and students to transform Abbey Fields into a hive of activity where young people can learn how to enhance the local environment and contribute towards meeting net zero emission."

The other AYP committee members are David Biesok, Chris Brannigan, John Mattocks and Susan Juned. Let them know if you are interested in helping.

THE GREIG HALL

Work continues apace with the restoration of the hall. Many of you came to the Christmas Fayre on the 4 December to see the hall and enjoy the Fayre. We had an excellent turnout (thank you) and will look to doing it again next year.

The major works we are undertaking are the electrics and the heating system. There is much more to be done to get the hall fully open. To maximise the usage of the hall we decided to go ahead with the installation of the heating system although we do not as yet have sufficient funds to pay for it. That's not as bad as it sounds as we are expecting more funding over the next couple of years. Following the public consultation, we approached the Public Works Loan Board for a £100k loan to ensure we have enough funds to complete the work. Sadly our anticipated spring reopening will now not happen due to a delay in the tender process but we now anticipate it will happen in the summer. We are already planning some events! When the hall is safe we will be asking volunteers to come along and help with tasks such as minor repairs and painting. Your help will be greatly appreciated

The working group have set up a charity to operate the hall when it is handed over by the Town Council. This will operate under Charity Commission rules and will give all members of the public the opportunity to be a part of the hall into the future.

The Crafty Lunch Club is a group for adults with learning and/ or physical disabilities where we meet to take part in a different craft each week, form friendships, share a hot meal together all whilst having a great deal of fun! Launched in December 2021 the group has seen us take part in baking, painting, weekly exercise, hold our own awards ceremony, meet a Roman soldier and sing along to popular songs.

This group aims to tackle social isolation not just for the adults who attend but also their carers. DOMESTIC CCTV SYSTEMS

Guidance for People Using CCTV or Camera Doorbells

Many of us have installed security cameras or doorbells which record people around our homes. If properly used, these are a deterrent against burglaries and may be useful to the police in the event of a crime. However, if your camera records anything outside the boundary of your property, you are subject to Data Protection Regulations (GDPR). The attached guidance notes issued by the Information Commissioner's Office will tell you what you need to do to comply with GDPR. Please read them on the link below:

Particular requirements are:

- You must not record more than is necessary to protect your property
- You must have visible notices stating that CCTV is in operation
- If requested, recordings must be made available to anyone who might appear on them and to the police
- Recordings must not be stored any longer than is necessary for protection of your property



ALCESTER CEMETERY

Our Winter Newsletter 2020 advised residents of the situation regarding the Cemetery on Birmingham Road. In summary:

• Although there appear to be large empty sections, our records clearly show that this is not the case

• Our Cemetery is almost full and depending on demand, has capacity for a further 2 years approximately

We have looked for a new site, but so far without success.

A recent ground penetrating survey of the old Cemetery, where very few headstones remain, revealed that this area contains many burials, so is not available to us. In January, the Cemetery Working Group identified a small number of areas which could provide an additional, (but limited) number of plots. To use these areas we will probably require planning permission and/or permission from the Diocese. We are now pursuing this short term solution, while continuing to seek an alternative for the longer term. We will provide residents with regular updates through our quarterly Newsletters. On a lighter note, courtesy of a grant from Waitrose, we have recently installed 5 bat boxes in the Cemetery. Let's hope these wonderful creatures will take up residence.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH ALCESTER

It could be you! Lottery fraud reports reach highest levels in two years New data from Action Fraud, the national reporting centre for fraud and cyber crime, reveals almost £1 million has been lost to lottery fraud in the past seven months. What is lottery fraud?

Criminals will contact unsuspecting victims informing them they have won a lottery or prize draw. The victim is then informed that they will need to pay an advance fee in order to receive their winnings. In reality, the winnings are non-existent and it is an attempt to steal the victim's money, personal or financial information. Action Fraud has received 629 reports of lottery fraud in a matter of months. Fraudsters use gift cards as a form of payment as they can be easily redeemed and sold on. These criminals don't need the physical card to redeem the value and instead get victims to share the serial code

on the back of the card with them.

In some instances, victims reported being asked for personal and financial information in order to obtain their alleged winnings.

Action Fraud advises that the public follow the advice of the '*Take Five to Stop Fraud*' campaign to keep themselves safe from fraud. (Please Google it!)

Stop! Unsolicited offers of large sums of money in return for a small upfront payment should always raise a red flag. Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

Challenge! Could it be fake? Remember, you can't win a prize in a competition you didn't enter. It's okay to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

Protect!: If you think you've been a victim of fraud, contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud online at actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040

Online charity fraud over the past year

Data from Action Fraud reveals that £1.6m of the public's money was lost to online charity fraud over the past year.

The fraud captured by this data includes requests for donations for non-existent charities and the fraudulent collection of funds for genuine charities. Members of the public must make some simple checks before giving to charity to make sure their donations reach the intended recipient. These include: **Check** the charity name and its registration number on the Charity Commission website to find out whether the charity is registered and committed to fundraising. **Look** out for the Fundraising Badge on charity marketing materials – when people see it, they can have confidence in the charity's fundraising. **Ask questions** about the cause – if people are still unsure about giving, they should always ask for more information. Legitimate causes will be happy to respond.
