#### **MAYOR'S MESSAGE**



I am extremely honoured to have been elected Mayor of our wonderful town for a second year. I would particularly like to thank my fellow councillors for their trust in me, and for giving me the opportunity to have a (hopefully) more normal year as Mayor. Congratulations to Councillor Vaughan Blake, who has been elected as Deputy Mayor for the coming year.

Before looking ahead, I would like to look back on just a few of the Town Council's achievements during the past year. We produced our Annual Report for the Annual Parish Meeting in April, and I would encourage you to have a look through it. It is available on our website, or in hard copy from our offices. This document summarises our activities and achievements in the previous year and gives an insight

into the work carried out by staff and councillors.

We achieved a planning milestone last July, when our Neighbourhood Development Plan was formally adopted by Stratford District Council. This was a huge piece of work, undertaken by a dedicated team of volunteer residents, staff and councillors. It is of great significance, as the policies contained in that plan must now be taken into account by the planning authority when considering applications within the parish. The plan is available on the Town Council website.

Remaining on the Planning theme, we have been working closely and very positively with Bloor Homes on the Allimore Lane development. Bloors have been very generous with providing materials for the Greig Hall refurbishment and I would like to thank them for that support, which is very much appreciated. Also, if you are a regular visitor to our Abbey Fields site you may well have noticed the addition of 'snakehotels' this year. These hibernacular and associated signage were provided by Bloors as part of their obligation to relocate a colony of Slow worms from the Allimore Lane site. As far as we can tell the 'refugees' have settled happily in their new homes!

We have employed a new youth leader, which has enabled the town's youth club to reopen with new enthusiasm and with a new emphasis on looking out for the mental health of our young people. This is very positive news, as many local youth clubs have been unable to reopen since Covid. We have now been able to secure grant funding to cover the leader's employment for at least another year.

And last but definitely not least we have been working flat out on the biggest project this council has ever tackled, and probably ever will. I'm referring of course to the Greig Hall restoration, but more on that shortly.

So looking ahead, we have plenty to keep us busy. We are restructuring the way that council meetings are organised, with fewer formal committees and making better use of more flexible working groups. One big advantage is that working groups can include volunteer residents working alongside councillors and staff to progress key projects for the town. We have seen this work incredibly well with the Neighbourhood Plan and the Greig Hall and I hope to see such groups operating across all our major projects, including our Health and Wellbeing work and improving our engagement and services for young people in Alcester. If you have interest or experience in any of our areas of work and would like to get involved, do please contact me or the Town Clerk.

We are really excited to be reopening the Greig Hall later this year, with a number of 'taster' events planned between September and Christmas. The Murder Mystery Medieval Banquet sounds particularly interesting! Look out for more details of our plans on our website, social media and posters nearer the time. If you feel that you can contribute in any way to the future running of the Hall and are not already on our volunteer list, do please contact us via the Greig Hall website or by calling the Town Council office.

I will continue to support Marathon Kids and the Plus5 project at Alcester Academy, and hope to hold a number of fundraising events for the project. Covid has inevitably created multiple difficulties, but we were able to complete the pilot and plan to move forward with the next phase soon.

It is fantastic to see Alcester's full programme of events beginning to return to normal. I hope to join you at many of these events and look forward to a wonderful summer.

#### NAMING OF NEW ROADS LAND SOUTH OF ALLIMORE LANE



In Autumn 2021, Alcester Town Council welcomed nominations for road names suitable for roads on the southern section of the Bloor Homes Allimore Lane housing development. Roads on the northern section have already been named after late Mayors of Alcester with the main spine road through the estate being Mayors Drive.

Planning approval was granted in December 2021 for the southern part of the new housing development and seven new roads will be created in this last phase of the new build programme with work potentially commencing in June/July 2022. The new roads will take a while to complete.

The Town Council has therefore had time to carefully consider the huge response of 65 nominations and started in the new year to face the challenging task of selecting just seven road names. Councillors decided to name the new roads after members of the community who had made a significant contribution to Alcester in a wide variety of ways.

So far this year, there has been a lot of activity as the concerns of the pandemic lessen and full capabilities at County return to normal. As support for Education in the Cabinet I have been greatly enthused by the work our teams at Warwickshire's Front Door have been doing in ensuring child welfare is paramount across the county and I also had the pleasure of attending our Youth Conference, held in Leamington Spa, which covered several topics from careers to the environment and mental health.

You will have seen Highways are catching up with their backlog and I have managed to get a few roads looked at including repainting, sign replacement and pothole repairs across Alcester. I have allocated the £35,000 made available to me for local repairs and initiatives for our roads for this year and will need submissions for next year's budget by the end of this year if you would like to make any suggestions. Also, entry for the Councillor's Grant has opened again with an increased budget of £8,000 so if you would like support for an initiative supporting the community, please put an application in before September.

#### ALCESTER COUNTRY MARKET



The Alcester Country Market was opened in 1969 and celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> year in 2019.

It trades as a commercial co-operative enterprise and gives an opportunity for local producers to sell their produce in a market setting. The market runs with producers carrying out the operational tasks of the market.

There are approximately 45 members producing the following: home baking, preserves, including fresh jars of honey, a variety of unique handmade crafts, very local, super fresh fruit and vegetables, garden and house plants and finally fresh flowers. All these items help the environment by not incurring air miles.

The market is ideally suited in its permanent situation in the High Street and is open from 09.00 until 13.00 every Friday,

and 10.00 until 13.00 on the first and third Saturday of the month. Alcester is one of three markets in Warwickshire and is the largest. New producers are always welcome and are required to assist with the markets.

#### **OVERSLEY GREEN RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION**



Spring has arrived in Oversley Green and that means that our own favourite footpath has come alive, with undergrowth blooming, blue tits nesting in the nest boxes and the occasional bluebell adding brilliant colour. If you have never visited this hidden wonder it starts at the Old Stratford Road, 100 yards east of Oversley Bridge and runs past the football field, through Oversley Hill Farm and eventually to Oversley Wood. For much of its length it follows the path of the Roman Saltway, which in Roman times ran from the Droitwich salt works through Alcester and along the line of the present A46 towards Stratford and eventually London. #### FRIENDS OF OVERSLEY WOOD



Oversley Wood is a mixed woodland, 20-minutes walk from Alcester. It is owned and managed by Forestry England and is a working woodland. In April 2020, due to the lockdown, it became apparent that lots of people were visiting to enjoy the tranquil atmosphere. Alongside the increasing visitor numbers, litter became a huge problem.

We decided to do something about it and started to litter pick and clear the debris from many years of picnics and general neglect. In just a few weeks forty bags of rubbish were collected and working closely with Forestry England, progress has been made.

In December 2021, we set up "Friends of Oversley Wood" Facebook group to inform, communicate and engage with the many users of the woodland. The group now has over 650 members.

Last year a part-time Ranger was appointed by Forestry England, whose area includes Oversley. This means that any actions can be dealt with effectively.

One of our on-going projects has been to clear the wood of hundreds of plastic tree-guards, dating back to the 1980s. New saplings are now planted with biodegradable tree guards.

Oversley Wood is bursting with diverse fauna and flora, including roe deer, muntjac deer, foxes, badgers and hares. Several species of owls and birds of prey are resident around the woods. Of course, the bluebells in Spring are the most stunning in the whole of the UK!

All we ask is that everyone respects and enjoys the woodland, and leaves no trace of being there!

## A BEHIND THE SCENES LOOK AT PLANNING MATTERS

**The purpose** of the Planning Committee is to assess if current planning applications that affect the parish, comply with, the National Planning Policy Framework, Stratford District Council's Development and Planning Policies -

Core Strategy Document, and the Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan. The committee are required to formulate responses on behalf of Alcester Town Council and report to the Full Council on all related matters.

**Objectives of the committee** include evaluating planning applications from Alcester residents, businesses, and groups, resolving on behalf of the council, and commenting to the appropriate Planning Authority.

**During March and April**, the committee reviewed a total of twelve applications, a response of NO OBJECTION was decided on 7 occasions, on 3 other applications the committee response was of OBJECTION. The committee chose to respond in SUPPORT of the remaining two applications in respect of the refurbishment of a dilapidated Grade II listed building.

Not a lot of people know that the committee also respond to Street Market applications. With this in mind **The Markets Licensing Policy** was reviewed and redrafted in areas referencing Licensing Agreements, Advertising Policy, and clarification of payment terms.

**To round off this update** I thought you would be interested to know that the Bloor Homes Development South of Allimore Lane is beginning the construction phase which will create several new roads, 7 of which will be named after deceased residents of Alcester who were nominated by members of the community. # THE GREIG HALL

The restoration of the Greig Hall has been a fascinating project- consuming both huge amounts of time and money.

Funding has now been secured from various grants and allocations to a sum which we anticipate will allow us to open

the Hall in September. This will be a 'soft opening' to allow us to assess what we still need to do to have a fully functioning venue. Bearing in mind that it is only 14 months since we took over the Hall this is a massive tribute to the volunteers and also Alcester Town Council, the Greig Working Group and in particular the Building Sub-Group. There are of course many, many others who have helped. The skills and enthusiasm of our volunteers has resulted in a Hall that is currently weather tight. Other work such as new electrics, lighting, insulation and most importantly a new heating system are being installed now. This will give our community a Hall that will last well into the future. The main working group aim is to hand over the reins later this year to a new charity, The Greig Hall (a Charitable Incorporated Organisation) set up to operate the Hall. The CIO has founding trustees but is open to interested members of the public to join and who may wish to oversee and contribute to the running of the Hall. If you wish to or know someone who would like to volunteer then please let us know.

#### **MINOR INJURIES UNIT AT STRATFORD HOSPITAL**



South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust and Coventry and Warwickshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) are working together to safely restore the Minor Injuries Unit at Stratford Hospital. Re-opening this service has been challenging due to on-going staff shortages, which we continue to experience across our services. However, working with the CCG, the Trust are developing a joint staffing model with support from external providers. This will ensure the unit is able to operate safely, whilst keeping the level of staff needed to run the main emergency site in South Warwickshire at Warwick Hospital. Both partners recognise how valued the service is by the local community and we are keen to mobilise the plan as quickly

as possible with a phased re-opening of the Minor Injuries Unit by summer 2022.

It could be so easy in Alcester, South Warwickshire to believe "Climate Change" has little relevance to our lives, however this is not the case. Climate change is the single greatest challenge facing the entire population of the planet.



Agencies across Warwickshire have secured £249,000 from the Home Office's Safer Streets fund.

The links take them to websites designed to steal your personal information and cash. Look out for spelling and grammatical mistakes and forward suspicious emails to <u>report@phishing.gov.uk</u>. Do your research about who you are paying. Check the charity's name and registration number on gov.uk/findcharity-information. Most charities with an
