Most especially, thank you so much to all of you who voted for us. This is a wonderful achievement and we are extremely proud.

These awards celebrate volunteers across Warwickshire who tirelessly give their time and energy to help others. WARWICKSHIRE BUSINESS GREEN RECOVERY GRANT SCHEME

Warwickshire County Council has established The Warwickshire Business Support Green Recovery Grant Scheme, a new initiative that will deliver £300,000 in decarbonising grants for Warwickshire businesses.

The scheme will provide capital aid to assist businesses with decarbonising projects which support long term sustainability and growth of the local economy.

The scheme will offer grants between £1,000 to £20,000 to cover up to 40% of the cost and is open to small businesses within the Warwickshire Area who meet the grant eligibility criteria. For more information see: https://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/greengrants

FREE SAFE AND WELL CHECK



Warwickshire Fire & Rescue Service offer a free Safe and Well check to residents across Warwickshire. They are carried out by firefighters and Community Fire Safety Officers and have helped protect thousands of residents across Warwickshire from the risk of fire in their home.

Are you or someone you know vulnerable? If you or someone you know can tick any of the boxes below, please telephone 01926 466282 and ask for a FREE Safe and Well Check

- Does not have a working smoke alarm
- Cannot hear smoke alarm if sounds
- Does not know what to do when smoke alarm sounds
- · Has a disability which does not allow them to leave the property
- Over 65 live in the property
- Smoker
- Children under 5 years of age
- Hoarding in the home
- Lives alone
- Prevention fall

The visit aims to assess the risk of fire in the home and how to minimise fire risks. A Copy of our Fire Safety in the Home leaflet will also be given as part of the Safe and Well check which contains lots of useful information about keeping safe. Additional Information will be given in relation to health and well-being including slips, trips and falls, smoking, electrical safety, scam callers and advice on how to improve your health and well-being.

Like many town and parish councils across the United Kingdom, Alcester Town Council voted to declare a climate emergency at the meeting of the Full Council in June this year. This underlines our commitment to take positive steps against climate change and to find practical and tangible solutions at a local level in collaboration with local groups and individuals. I have been inspired by the actions of other councils within Stratford District such as Oxhill Parish Council who organised a community event earlier this year to showcase how they are taking practical steps in conjunction with residents and large utility companies such as

Severn Trent Water.

So far, Alcester Town Council has hosted three meetings of the Climate Emergency Action Group which were attended by representatives of many local organisations and residents. It was extremely heartening to hear about the great practical measures that are already been done in our town and as well as their plans for the future.

Climate change is one of the most pressing issues of our time and Alcester Town Council intends to play its part by working within the community and partnering with neighbouring parish councils. ALCESTER & DISTRICT COMMUNITY RESPONDERS



We are recruiting!

The local Community First Responders group is looking for more volunteers to join their ranks.

No prior medical knowledge is needed, but a calm temperament and a desire to serve the local community is essential. There is a formal application and interview process, and if successful a candidate is booked onto the training course.

Full training for the national CFR qualification is delivered by instructors the West Midlands Ambulance Service NHS Trust Training School.

Once training is completed, uniform and PPE are provided from scheme funds, and following a probation period of up to 6 months, the CFR can then respond to 999 calls alone, in the liveried scheme car, if they wish to.

Candidates should be:

- Aged 18 and over (no upper age limit)
- Have a current clean driving licence
- Be physically fit
- Have a caring attitude with good communication skills
- Be highly responsible, professional and trust worthy
- Able to remain calm under pressure
- Able to handle sensitive, stressful and often demanding situations

The reason for the proposed change is to reduce the amount of fencing and timber that needs to be replaced when or if damage or decay occurs with a potential cost saving in excess of £3000.

PLANNING MATTERS

Stratford-on-Avon and Warwick District Councils are working together to produce a new South Warwickshire Local Plan to cover the combined geographic area. Alcester is within the combined geographic area.

The South Warwickshire Local Plan (SWLP)

The SWLP will set out a long-term spatial strategy for housing, jobs, infrastructure, and climate change for both Districts.

The Plan comprises 8 stages and is expected to replace the strategic policies of the existing <u>Stratford-on-Avon Core Strategy</u> (https://www.stratford.gov.uk/planning-building/core-strategy.cfm) and <u>Warwick Local Plan</u> (https://www.warwickdc.gov.uk/info/20410/new_local_plan) which are soon due for review.

Scoping and Call for Sites Consultation took place during May and June 2021. Amongst other things this consultation asked where in South Warwickshire new development should be located and how we should accommodate growth. The *Consultation Statement* was published in January 2022 and can be found, with a more detailed explanation, by following this link:

The next stage is the publication of the *South Warwickshire Local Plan Issues and Options Consultation*, which is expected to be presented to the two Councils' Joint Committee in December 2022, with a 6-week consultation period commencing in early January 2023.

Yours views are important to this process, and I encourage you to take part in the consultation when it is published.

For Planning applications over 20sq m, a Climate Change Checklist, focusing on Climate Change adaption and mitigation, is an important document and must be completed.

'YOU CAN ONLINE', A NEW INITIATIVE TO SUPPORT ONLINE INCLUSION IN AN INCREASINGLY DIGITAL WORLD



Warwickshire County Council has launched You Can Online, a brand-new initiative delivered through Warwickshire Libraries. The initiative provides support and access to digital tablet devices for individuals, families, and local communities to help with the development and learning of key digital skills. Digital tablets can be borrowed from Warwickshire Libraries. It is hoped that this scheme will help enable people to feel safer, more confident, and included in the online space.

The You Can Online digital Lenovo M10 tablets, which are pre-loaded with a selection of apps and come with internet data included, are available for library members to borrow

for up to six weeks at a time, completely free of charge. During this time, library members will receive regular support from Warwickshire Libraries' IT team to learn and develop the digital skills they need. If someone is not a library member and would like to borrow a tablet, they can join their local library for free by asking at their local library in person or by visiting <u>www.warwickshire.gov.uk/jointhelibrary</u>

Alcester's newest town councillor, Gavin Smithers, was elected on 8 September 2022. He is now addressing a number of issues residents have raised with him.

Gavin was born in Oxford and graduated from Oxford University in 1982. After twenty years in retail banking, he owned and ran a soft play centre in Redditch. All his children attended Alcester schools, and two of his daughters live in the town now. Both work for Helping Hands.

He has been appointed lead councillor for play areas and looks forward to this area of responsibility.

"I will try to resolve residents' concerns via our partners at the district and county councils where we can. Alcester is a great place to live. Council tax can't pay for everything we'd wish for, but I want to contribute in some way to the good work which underpins our community".

A resident of Birch Abbey asked Gavin Smithers, our newest councillor, to get the overgrown vegetation cut back.

County Highways at Warwickshire County Council took up the request and the Tuery is tidier now. Alan Jones of County Highways says that the footpath will also be inspected to see if temporary repairs to the surface are possible. He also suggested that residents whose gardens adjoin the Tuery can help by keeping an eye on any

overgrowth from their own gardens.

Residents can report problems with footpaths, dangerous trees or vegetation direct to the county council on-line, or via any town councillor.

Gavin said "It's pleasing to find our Highways partners so willing to help, within their own cost constraints. Whilst it's not always easy to know who is responsible for a piece of land or overgrowth, I'd encourage residents not to keep these issues to themselves".



POLICE WEEKLY DROP IN SURGERIES

On Wednesdays evenings 6- 9pm Alcester South Safer Neighbourhood Team (Alcester SNT) has been opening the doors to the old front office at Alcester Police station for you to speak to a member of your safer neighbourhood team about any community concerns you may have, to gain advice on anything policing related including crime prevention or just simply to have a chat and get to know your local policing team.

Please note: Due to the nature of Policing there will be occasions where the session may need to be cancelled at short notice. If this is the case Alcester SNT will do their upmost to advertise this by social media, but this may not always be possible.

CONTACTING THE POLICE

The Police would like to remind residents that they need to report any policing issues directly to them. A direct report from a resident is logged onto their database and builds evidence for resource to be applied to issues.

Social Media conversations do not contribute to this important database.

Points of contact:

999

This is the number to ring if there is an emergency incident happening right now that needs an immediate police presence – if life is at risk, people are injured, offenders are nearby or a crime is in progress.

Reporting online

This is the preferred method to contact police and report any non-emergency issues which do not require an immediate response. This also includes reporting non-emergency collisions and anti-social behaviour.
