my congratulations to Councillor Mike Bowe on being elected as Deputy Mayor for the 2023/24 year.

I was first co-opted to the Town Council in 2019 and have enjoyed serving on the committees for Community Care, Planning and Finance & General Purposes. I will continue to serve as Lead Councillor for Business & Tourism and will seek to promote Alcester for both aspects wherever possible.

I have lived in Alcester for over thirty years and am still impressed by the community spirit shown by the army of volunteers who help to make this town so special. Without them, there would be no Food Festival, Alcester in Bloom, Christmas Lights or bunting or the Court Leet Street Market.

It was very gratifying that Alcester was awarded National Star Council of the year for 2022/23. Being selected from over 10,000 councils reflects the efforts of both Councillors and its staff.

I do hope that you will be able to support my events that will raise funds for these two worthwhile charities.

PLANNING MATTERS

Housing Needs Survey - Update

In the Spring edition of the newsletter, my report focused on the Housing Needs Survey which has now closed. Thank you to those who responded to the survey. Warwickshire Rural Community Council administered the consultation on behalf of the Town Council and have concluded their analysis of the comments submitted from Alcester residents. The Town Council has recently received their report and the Planning Committee will

consider their findings at the scheduled Planning Committee meeting in June. The information will be important when forming our policies at the time of the Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan update.

South Warwickshire Local Plan – Update

The Town Council's Planning Committee formulated and submitted a response to the second stage of the South Warwickshire Local Plan (SWLP) that covered the Issues and Options public consultation. Stratford and Warwick District Councils are currently processing the responses and their submissions will be published in due course.

The Issues and Options consultation provided a second opportunity for residents and stakeholders to have their say on the emerging Local Plan and included different options for selecting preferences to planning policy issues and the policy options to address them. It also set out broad options for consideration on where to best accommodate new development in the future.

The third stage of the SWLP will be the Preferred Options public consultation likely to be between July and October 2023.

When published, the Town Council's Planning Committee will scrutinise the Preferred Options to ensure that Alcester's best interests are represented.

THE FOOD STORY

A leading national farm education charity called LEAF (Linking Environment And Farming) Education awarded Our Lady's primary school with a Silver Level Demonstration School award, in recognition for its commitment to using food production, farming and the environment as part of its broad and balanced curriculum.

The school were praised by the Mayor, Cllr Kathryn Cargill, who came to celebrate with the school, for collaborating with numerous local farms including Ragley Hall Estate farm, Cleeve Prior Community Orchard, and Oversley Hill farm to give students fantastic opportunities to learn about how food can be

produced with consideration for the environment. In addition, the school are embarking on a pioneering new approach to their summer residential by taking part in a week-long trip to Lower Treginnis Farm in Pembrokeshire. Year 5 and 6 children will be able to experience first-hand how to manage livestock, feed lambs, take part in woodland studies, collect eggs and harvest food to cook healthy recipes in the onsite kitchen with help from farm staff and charitable groups such as LEAF Education and Farms for City Children.

Head mistress, Mrs Maggie Gourlay said "We are very proud to have been recognised by LEAF Education for our work in connecting children to the story of their food. We believe children should be inspired to learn about food, farming and the environment to ensure they grow up with the values and motivation to promote sustainability."

Warwickshire Vision Support is also known as Warwickshire Association For The Blind. We are a registered charity which was founded in 1911.

We are based in Warwick town centre, but

work across the county with over 3,200 people. We offer a variety of community-based services to support blind and partially sighted people in their everyday lives.

One of our main services is providing 4 weekly and 7 monthly 'Vision Support Centres' across Warwickshire. These are meetings of predominantly older, blind and partially sighted people, where we organise activities, training and demonstrations, and provide important information, advice and guidance. In Alcester, we run a monthly 'Vision Support Centre' on the third Tuesday of each month 1.30pm to 3.30pm at Malt Mill Lane Community Centre, Malt Mill Lane, Alcester, B49 5QR.

If you are visually impaired, or know someone who is, feel free to pop into the support centre and speak to our staff and volunteers about what we do and how we can help. We are also keen to hear from people who could volunteer some time to help run our support centres, and our social clubs.

ALCESTER'S ROMAN MUSEUM WILL SOON BE TWENTY!

A crucial part of the history of the Museum was the acquisition of Globe House by Stratford on Avon District Council. It had been the Magistrates Court until it closed in 1989. The district council bought the building in 1999 and renovated it.

Warwickshire County Council, Stratford on Avon District Council and Alcester Heritage Trust formed a partnership and, in August 2000, a successful bid was submitted to the Heritage Lottery Fund. Finally, in 2004, the Roman Museum was able to open its doors to the first visitors.

Volunteers have run the museum since the day it opened. Alcester Heritage Trust is run by volunteers. Volunteers greet visitors, give talks and help to deliver school visits. Many children have visited the museum with their schools and enjoyed the experience of seeing how life was lived in Roman Britain. Next year we will celebrate our opening. We are already planning an exciting programme of Roman-style activities. Keep an eye on our website (romanalcester.org) for the latest information.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

As the weather warms up, the focus has been on getting the parishes engaged with litter picking and improving the state of our roads. Residents put this as a high priority and I have been focused on getting signs repaired, markings repainted and improving safety. For example, we recently installed new bollards at the entrance and exit of Hopkins Precinct to help prevent cars parking on the pavement and blocking access. Unfortunately, not all schemes go to plan and businesses were upset with the apparent impact to their trade. So further reviews are taking place to help with the other issue, the quantity of parking spaces. Another major challenge is school drop off and pick up which is

being enforced from September onwards by a new team that County are supporting. In the meantime, it is important parents and pupils know where it is safe to park and help to always maintain access. Therefore improving signage, repainting restrictions and deploying 'police buddies' help to raise awareness.

On a side note, I wanted to have a shout out to the Alcester Community Fridge, which I supported using the Councillor Grant, which is providing a fantastic service to residents in helping to battle against food waste and food poverty. If you haven't visited already, I would highly recommend it.

WHATSAPP ACCOUNT TAKEOVER SCAM

Criminals are targeting WhatsApp users by posing as a friend and asking for a security code. Action Fraud has received over 60 reports relating to this scam.

The scam begins when a criminal gets access to another WhatsApp account which has you listed as a contact. The criminal, posing as your friend or someone that's a member of a WhatsApp group you're in, will then send you seemingly normal messages to try and start a conversation with you. However, around the same time you will receive a text message from WhatsApp with a six-digit code. This is because the criminal has been trying to login to WhatsApp using your mobile number. The criminal will claim that they sent you their code by accident and ask you to help them by sending it to them. Once the criminal has this code, they can login to your WhatsApp account and lock you out.

The criminal will then use the same tactic with your WhatsApp contacts in an effort to steal more accounts and use them to perpetrate fraud.

- Set up two-step verification to give an extra layer of protection to your account: Tap Settings
 Account >Two-step verification > Enable
- THINK. CALL. If a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always
 call the person to confirm their identity
- Never share your account's activation code (that's the 6 digit code you receive via SMS
- You can report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions
