MAYOR'S CIVIC AWARDS

There are four categories of awards - Young Person of the Year, Community Organisation of the Year, Business of the Year (new for 2023) and Citizen of the Year. Nominations are open from Monday 13 November until Wednesday 13 December 2023.

Nomination forms are available to download from the Town Council website/News page or hard copies are available from the office. Nominations need to say why the nominee should receive an award plus the benefits resulting from the nominee's service to a particular field, area, group or community. Criteria apply to nominees and this information is on the form.

The Civic Awards will be promoted on the website, social media, newsletter and on noticeboards.

The Mayor selects the winner from each category and a presentation is made at an Awards Evening which will once again be held at The Greig Hall on Friday 19 January 2024.

PLANNING MATTERS

Housing Needs Survey Findings

An ongoing major project for Alcester's Planning Committee is identifying the types of homes local people need that are in high demand, but in short supply. To that end a Housing Needs Survey was undertaken earlier this year, aimed specifically at residents that had a need for alternative housing and wished to live within the parish of Alcester. It was important to gather this evidence to assist

the Town Council in considering if there were possible future courses of action that may overcome those needs and if so, what they might be.

The report from the Housing Needs Survey highlighted that a majority of respondents indicated, in order of preference, their need for the following.

- In first place, a 'starter/first home'
- In second place, a more accessible home
- In third place, looking to downsize

Two-bedroom dwellings were the most popular choice followed by three-bedroom dwellings, with more than half of all respondents preferring to rent.

Where do we take the project from here?

Further research to guide the Council's approach on the direction and strategy going forward is underway. This part of the project is initially being undertaken by a working group of councillors, supported by the Town Clerk. Their task is to develop Terms of Reference that will enable the formulation of a plan with emphasis on identifying if there are parcels of land or brownfield sites within the parish of Alcester which would be suitable to provide development opportunities for quality affordable, social and open market housing.

The Working Group are expected to present the recommended Terms of Reference for approval in February 2024.

ROAD SAFETY AND SPEED AWARE WORKING GROUP

In October we were delighted to meet with the Principal of Alcester Grammar School, Ms Thorpe

where we discussed how the school is working with the local community to find solutions to issues on Birmingham Road (see photo).

ALCESTER HERITAGE TRUST

The Roman Museum is planning to celebrate its 20th anniversary next year. There will be a Festival in the Museum and the Library on Saturday 6 July 2024 - the same day as the Duck Race. There will be re-enactors, mosaics, togas, games, photo displays and involvement from schools and community organisations and Warwick Museum Service.

In addition, the RSC will be supporting the event, providing visual material from past productions to be used as stimulus material for displays of Roman helmets and shields.



COMMUNITY SHED PROJECT IS LAUNCHED!

The Town Council has approved an ambitious project to turn the old redundant squash courts at the rear of the Greig Hall into a dedicated space for the community to make, do and mend. The building, which the Council took over with a 125 lease from Stratford District Council in 2021, requires significant repairs to make it watertight and safe. Following on from the resounding success of the Repair Café, a number of repairers formed the Alcester Community Shed group. The group has already been successful in securing some funding for the project and many residents have indicated their support for it.

The aim is for the venture to be modelled on the Men's Shed movement. This recognises that men are not necessarily good at discussing health issues and Men's Sheds were founded to contribute to both men's mental and physical health as well as providing a safe space to talk and share practical skills. The Alcester Community Shed will be open to all – men and women, young and old. It is planned to have 2 workshop areas, one fitted out with machine tools and the other a multipurpose space which will also



become the permanent home for the Repair Café.

SUSTAINABLE LIVING SAVES MONEY AND THE PLANET

It is safe to say that living in a more sustainable way has now gone beyond being a trend. It affects all areas in business as well as life at home and has shifted for many to be the new, expected norm. At Alcester Town Council we continue to review our processes to become a sustainable council.

But is it easy or costly to make that shift? The answer is yes, it can be easy and no, it doesn't have to be costly. In fact, it can save you money to go green.

- Recycling has been made very easy for most items we use in our homes. Even most takeaway or ready meal containers can be recycled as long as they are clean. If you want to check you can visit this website: https://www.stratford.gov.uk/waste-recycling/our-recycling-collection.cfm
- Metal straws can be used with re-usable cups for the coffee shop or with re-usable bottles. Metal straws are easily cleaned and can be used again and again. If you bring your own coffee mug to the shop you are not only more sustainable but your coffee will stay hot for longer
- Storing food in re-usable containers, including your sandwiches from home is much better for the environment than buying expensive zip lock bags or cling film
- Buying second hand clothing from charity shops or second hand online retailers will save you lots of money whilst reusing perfectly good clothes that someone else has just got a bit tired of

ALCESTER FLOOD RESILIENCE

As we are only too aware, Alcester has a history of flooding with the most recent serious events in 1998 and 2007 when the town centre was submerged, and many forced to move out of their homes in the aftermath. The Town Council coordinates a team of volunteer flood wardens as part of its emergency planning who during poor weather, monitor conditions and stand ready to help and prepare residents who are at risk of flooding.

After prolonged rain over a few hours during the 19th and 20th October, the Environment Agency issued a Flood Warning which prompted the team to be on standby. Additional sand was ordered by the Town Council and sandbags were made available to residents living in areas at risk.

Around 60 filled sandbags were handed out, primarily to people living in Oversley Green, Ragley Mill Lane, Tibbets Close and School Road. At one point in the early evening of the 20th October, river levels on the Arrow upstream in Studley were only 9cm lower than were seen in the flooding of 2007. Sadly, this time some residents were impacted by water in their homes and the School Road allotments were badly damaged. Thankfully however the rivers did not breach the town's flood defences on this occasion.

The experience serves as a reminder of our risk of flooding, and that despite best endeavours, the Town Council has insufficient resources to protect all vulnerable residents from future impacts. It is a homeowner's personal responsibility to protect their own property. Considering recent events, the Council's Community Safety Working Group is reviewing its Flood Plan and will seek to engage with residents including support with personal flood plans and recruitment of additional volunteer flood wardens. ALCESTER MALE VOICE CHOIR CELEBRATES SPECIAL ANNIVERSARY

The Alcester Male Voice choir are celebrating their 50th year, a remarkable achievement. But what is even more remarkable is that fifty years later Judith Land, then a young school teacher who founded the choir, is still the choir's Director of Music and the driving force behind the choir's many successes.

It all started back in 1974, when Judith was Head of Music at Alcester Grammar School and was having trouble persuading male students to join her mixed choir for a one off concert. She turned to male colleagues and parents for help and rapidly achieved the numbers required to create a well balanced mixed choir. After the concert the new male members asked Judith if they could continue, and with the addition of a few more members from the wider community, the Alcester Male Voice Choir was born.

When Judith started the choir, little did she think that she would still be running it 50 years later and be starting on a journey that would be life changing. For Judith this is an incredible achievement and represents a lifetime of dedication & commitment. From those humble beginnings Judith has become one of the most respected and well known leaders in the male voice choir movement.

The choir will be marking this special year with a service of thanksgiving at St Nicholas Church on Sunday 14 January 2024 at 3pm and with two concerts at Ragley Hall over the weekend of 20 and 21 April 2024.

ALCESTER MUSICAL THEATRE COMPANY HITTING NEW HEIGHTS!





NEW DISABLED ART SCHEME

An innovative pilot scheme to improve the experience of disabled people going to theatres, concerts and festivals was unveiled by the Arts Council England in November. It includes the right to a free companion ticket for anyone who needs support from another person to attend an event. There has been concern over a lack of consistency in pricing such tickets. The scheme will be up and running next year.

Participation is not mandatory, but creative and cultural organisations that want to take part can visit a pilot website (https://allin.online/) to register their interest.

All In is a partnership between Arts Council England, Arts Council of Wales, Arts Council of Northern Ireland and Creative Scotland and will apply to museums, galleries, theatres, libraries, performing arts venues and festivals.

It follows the success of Hynt, Wales's access scheme for theatres and arts centres. A new report, funded by Arts Council England, found that Hynt has led to a decade of increased accessibility for cultural events in Wales.
