CLERKS CORNER

Precept 2024-25

The Town Council sets the precept each year in January. The precept is the primary source of income for the Town Council and is a small part of the Council Tax which residents pay to Stratford-on-Avon District Council.

At the Full Council meeting on 9 January, the Town Council agreed to request a precept of £369,340 from Stratford-on-Avon District Council for the year 2024-25. The precept in 2023-24 was £329,813.

Residents will be well aware that everything is going up in price and bills paid by Councils are subject to the same pressures. Councillors have tried to keep the increase as low as possible but regrettably options for savings are extremely limited.

The agreed precept will result in an increase in the precept charge to Alcester residents (Band D) from £144.57 to £157.40 per annum. This rise is equivalent to £1 per month for a Band D Council Taxpayer.

The Town Council uses the precept to run council business and to provide a wide range of services to residents. These include four allotment sites, four playgrounds, the cemetery on Birmingham Road, civic and community events such as Remembrance Sunday, grants to voluntary organisations, the Health and Wellbeing projects, maintenance and upkeep of the Eric Payne Community Centre, maintenance of Priory Meadow, Centenary Field and other open spaces and miscellaneous street furniture such as signs, benches and bins.

PLANNING MATTERS

Housing Needs Survey - Update

February's Planning Committee approved the terms of reference known as **The Way Forward** requiring Alcester Town Council to develop a plan to bring together landowners, developers, investors, government agencies, County Council and Stratford District Council to address the chronic need for social and affordable housing within the parish.

The Planning Committee will present a proposition at the Full Council meeting on 5th March 2024 recommending adoption of **The Way Forward** terms of reference.

A sub-group consisting of committee members will hold their first meeting later in March.

Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan (ANDP) Review Steering Group - Update

Membership of the steering group involving local residents and town councillors plus the Town Clerk and Deputy Town Clerk held their inaugural meeting on 16 January 2024, recording members in attendance and included the election of the Chair and Deputy Chair.

The Steering Group agreed to review the existing Neighbourhood Development Plan and policies, initially focusing on sections of the ANDP that address Natural Environment and Community, Leisure, and Wellbeing in concert with the impact of the emerging South Warwickshire Local Plan alongside any relevant national policies.

Meetings are scheduled for Tuesdays 20 February and 26 March 2024 at Globe House Priory Road Alcester B49 5DZ at 10.30am.

Members of the public are welcome to attend and observe the meeting.

ROAD SAFETY AND SPEED AWARE WORKING GROUP

Thank you to everyone who responded to our December survey. Your feedback will support other evidence of local road safety risks and the working group to work with the Police and other organisations to make improvements.

In January, the group met with Gary Strain from the Warwickshire Police Road Safety Unit. Gary demonstrated a new approved speed detection device that is used by neighbouring Community Speed Watch groups. We are pleased to report that the Town Council will fund a device for Alcester Community Speed Watch to support more frequent monitoring sessions across the town.

Finally, we were delighted to be able to meet with Mrs Newell, Head of School at St Nicholas Primary School (see photo). We discussed grit provision on St Faiths Road and inconsiderate parking during school drop off and pick up times. We are grateful to the school for their support, and we have agreed to work together on the issues in the future.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

With the new financial year upon us, it has been a difficult time for Councils as we look to set new budgets. This year, Warwickshire County Council has seen a dramatic increase in costs mainly associated with Adult Social Care, Children Social Care, SEND and associated provisions, along with a further 3,000 school places needed in the coming five years. To meet these growing demands whilst investing in apprenticeships, addressing the cost-of-living crisis and supporting our climate change targets, among many other commitments, it has been necessary to increase the budget in the coming year. This means for residents, there will be an additional 4.99% increase, broken up into a 2.99% core council increase and a further 2% to cover social care.

This will enable the council to continue to invest £20M into school places, £25M to support the expansion of Resource Provision to support those with SEND in mainstream settings and a further £50M into the Warwickshire Investment Fund, demonstrating our commitment to helping the recovery and growth of Warwickshire for the benefit of residents and communities.

COMMUNITY SHED PROJECT UPDATE

Work is now well underway to transform the redundant squash courts behind the Greig Hall into a community shed. Modelled on the Mens Shed Movement, this will become THE place in Alcester for members of the community to make, repair, meet and learn new practical skills. One of the courts will become a workshop and the other a public space where the highly successful Repair Café will relocate once refurbishment is complete.

The court walls have been insulated and plastered and a merry team of volunteers came along to freshen them up with several coats of paint. Electrical work has begun and as you read this article roof cladding work should be underway. This is essential to make the building safe and watertight as well as adding insulation. Future work includes new ceilings, heating, doors and stairs. Grants and donations are being secured to meet costs.

It will be a community space licenced to the Community Shed Group to use. A second public meeting was held on 1 February when enthusiastic attendees provided their input as to how the rooms should be designed and kitted out.

The hope is to restore Kevin to his youth, and to convert him to be used as a home for a defibrillator.

SPEND

A new support group for parents with children and young people who have special needs has been launched in Alcester.

Created through a collaboration of local parents and Alcester Town Council Health & Wellbeing Partnership, the first session took place in January and the response was incredible with amazing feedback from all who attended.

Jen Hopkins, one of the founding members of the group, saw the need in the local area for such a support group with people turning to her through her role as Children and Families Worker for the Alcester Minster and personally as a SEN (Special educational needs) parent herself.

The group, named 'SPEND', will now meet on the second Friday of every month in the Depot at the Eric Payne Community Centre in Alcester from 9.45am -11.15am. It will be a safe place for SEN parent carers to come together to make connections and share experiences and information with other people walking the same path. Professional speakers will be invited

and there will be opportunities to do mindfulness activities together. The aim is for parents to feel supported, not just with practical advice and assistance but also with their own emotional well-being. Furthermore, there is a supporting private Facebook Group called 'SPEND Parent Support', that SEN parents in the area can request to join.

All SEN parents are very welcome at the SPEND monthly group. There is no need to book, you can simply turn up and will be assured of a very warm welcome.

MAYOR'S CIVIC AWARDS



THE DIGITAL SWITCHOVER

The UK's telephone network is changing. By the end of 2025, most telephone providers will have moved their customers from landlines served by the old analogue (copper) network to new upgraded landline services which use digital technology. This is commonly referred to as The Digital Switchover. BT Consumer Group - the largest provider of landline phone services in the UK will start migrating their customers in the West Midlands region from February 2024 and to coincide with this, they are hosting a number of roadshows / drop-in events in the Warwickshire and Solihull area. This will enable their customers to find out more about the switchover to their digital phone network known as Digital Voice.



OVERSLEY GREEN RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION (OGRA)

What does Oversley Wood mean to you? Sometime in February, Forestry England who manage the wood on behalf of the nation, hope to have issued a strategy paper covering the future of their land in Warwickshire. Oversley Wood occupies just under 240 acres so their plans will be interesting. The paper comes at a time of change in access to the wood, with the historic parking location recently restricted and no designated parking area other than in Alcester, around a mile away. This has caused some

strange parking behaviours as visitors who love the wood suddenly look for new places to park. For an organisation whose mission is "... to connect everyone with the nation's forests" this restriction seems a shame.

You will shortly have an opportunity to have a say in how Oversley Wood develops by responding to a public consultation on the strategy document. It will be available through the Forestry England Consultation Hub by search Consultation Hib on their website at www.forestryengland.uk

Top of the objectives must to make it easier for visitors to access the woods without adding to the parking congestion in Alcester and that means an official car park. If the mission is indeed to "...connect everyone with the nations forests" then Forestry England should be urged to take the lead and find a way to provide an official car park so that everyone can enjoy the bluebells in the spring in a safe and convenient way.

WASSAIL!

The Community Orchard was awakened from a winter slumber on 3 February when a cast ensemble of Winter Queen and Holly King, White Hart Morris men and beast entertained a good 200 strong members of the public.

Led by torch light from the Eric Payne Community Centre, the arrival at the orchard had a very ethereal look with lights. Amongst the dance and song ribbons were hung from a chosen tree's branches. "Oh little apple tree, we have come to wassail thee."

Wassailing is an ancient Nordic tradition that awakens the apple from its winter sleep, the banging of pots and pans and sometimes muskets are fired to ward off evil spirits and encourage a good harvest of apples for pies and cider in the summer.

Following the blessing by the Winter Queen and Holly King, the crowd were invited to dip toast in cider to hang on the apple tree. The cider

used was from the late John Ross who organised a wassail back in 2015? The assembly then made their way back to the Eric Payne Community Centre for free hot dogs for the children (sponsored by the Town council) which went down very well, as well as cider from local maker Hogan's.

The aim was to highlight the Orchard to the greater Alcester population not only as a quiet tranquil location to visit but a valuable source of food and ecological enrichment.



ROYAL BRITISH LEGION- ALCESTER

BIKEABILITY

Would you or any member of your family like Bikeability cycle training to improve confidence when cycling?

Bikeability cycle training is a practical training programme providing primarily schoolchildren with a life skill enabling them to cycle confidently and competently on today's roads.

In Alcester, Level 1 & 2 training for children is usually offered in Primary School in Year 5 or above. These courses are run over 2 consecutive days, where children receive a realistic cycling

experience equipping them with the skills to cycle short journeys.

Level 3 training for children and young people in Year 6 or above is aimed at students who have previously achieved Levels 1 & 2. This is delivered in one 3hour session. Level 3 equips riders with the skills to tackle more complex roads and traffic situations such as roundabouts and junctions controlled by traffic lights. The training also includes guidance and practice on planning routes. If there is enough local interest in the courses, then they could be delivered 'free' locally during the school holidays.
