Sarah will be missed by everyone at ATC and we hope that she enjoys her well earned retirement! Vanessa Lowe, Town Clerk


#### **Housing for Local People**

As part of the review of the Alcester Neighbourhood Plan, the Town Council Working Group is looking for small parcels of land which could be used to provide houses/flats to meet local needs.

The land would need to be within or immediately adjacent to Alcester's built-up area - which is shown edged in a black line on the map below.

In order to keep rents or purchase costs for the housing affordable, it would not be possible to pay full market value for the land but it is only by restricting the housing for local people that a planning permission for new housing within the Green Belt might be obtained. So, a landowner keen to help local people stay local wouldn't really be losing out.

If you have around 1 acre of land (0.4 ha), appropriately located in relation to Alcester's built-up area, or you know someone that does, please contact the Town Clerk for an initial discussion: <a href="mailto:clerk@alcester-tc.gov.uk">clerk@alcester-tc.gov.uk</a> Future generations of Alcestrians will be grateful that you made that contact.

# ROAD SAFETY AND SPEED AWARE WORKING GROUP

Thank you again to everyone who responded to our resident survey on road safety. We had over 100 responses with many recurring themes:

- Speeding and Loud Vehicles: Many residents reported issues with speeding and noisy vehicles, particularly on roads like Arden Forest Road, Birmingham Road, and Stratford Road. Suggestions included speed cameras, reduced speed limits, and traffic calming measures.
- Illegal or Inconsiderate Parking: Parking problems are common, especially around schools.

  Residents suggested better parking options, enforcement of parking restrictions, and residents-only parking schemes.
- **Traffic Calming Measures**: There is a strong demand for speed bumps, pedestrian crossings, and other traffic calming measures to improve safety.
- **General Safety Concerns**: Issues like noise pollution, dangerous driving, and the need for better road markings and signage were frequently mentioned.

Based on your feedback, the working group are exploring opportunities to roll out improvements with support from other agencies and the Police. In June the Town Council approved funding for a two-week traffic speed and volume survey on Stratford Road, with the results being a potential precursor to new traffic calming measures introduced along that stretch.

We continue to work with our schools and other local organisations in exploring tactical measures to address parking concerns especially near Birmingham Road and St Faith's Road. Many of the potential improvements are outside of the remit of the Town Council. However, with your valuable feedback we can work with all relevant bodies to improve safety on our roads.

#### **Exploring Economic Growth, Job creation and Skills Training**

Alcester Town Council is exploring opportunities to support economic growth for rural businesses in Alcester and the surrounding rural community. This includes facilitating the needs of rural businesses to access local employability and skills training for young people and adults to develop skills in a particular industry or upskill to another type of work.

In close collaboration with Stratford District Council's Economic Development and Inward Investment team and Minerva Mill, a scheme is underway to create a new Rural Enterprise Hub to be located in Minerva Mill from September 2024. This will initially be a pilot programme.

#### Rural Enterprise Hub – Pilot Programme Explained

#### The Brief

To create a Hub that provides a service to rural and agricultural industries within the rural landscape, fostering rural enterprise, unlocking the potential and exploring opportunities, for the rural community local businesses offering advice, material, and practical support in particular areas of interest, such as Grant Funding, Skills Training, Apprenticeships, Technological & Agricultural Innovation and Small Business Start-Ups

#### Why a pilot programme?

This pilot programme will run until March 2025 and is designed to assess the viability of an idea, to test things out on a small scale. uncover viability and scalability and enable processes and procedures to be evaluated, before knowing if it will be an option for the business.

This pilot project will help to Identify any risks and issues before committing more resources and enable an accurate budget and investment appraisal to be determined, depending on the outcome, at the conclusion of the pilot programme in March 2025.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

It has been a busy few months filled with exciting developments and community support initiatives. I had the pleasure of reviewing sixteen fantastic applications for the £8,000 available through the Councillor Grant. I am delighted to announce the following community projects have been awarded funding:

Crafty Lunch Club, Alcester Community Fridge, The Depot Youth Club, Alcester Community Shed. Acorns, School Readiness Pilot, Warwickshire Young Carers, Alcester Bee Squared project, SPEND along with other village parish initiatives.

Our community is vibrant and full of potential, and it's an honour to support these worthy causes. Let's give a big round of applause to all these wonderful projects that will undoubtedly bring positive changes to our area!

Warwickshire County Council has secured access to a national £400M fund aimed at providing street charging for electric vehicles (EVs). I've been in discussions with our team about potential sites in Alcester and Bidford on Avon, specifically targeting areas where residents do not have off-street parking. We're working on integrating EV chargers with minimal disruption to pavements, utilising streetlights and bollards. This initiative will help our community seamlessly transition electric cars.

As 99% of my inbox is related to Highways, I wanted to urge residents to report any highways faults they encounter. This includes issues like potholes, street light problems, rights of way issues, faulty traffic lights, roadwork concerns, and blocked drains.

#### STRATFORD ON AVON DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

**UBUS:** The UBUS service has been retendered and will be replaced by a new service from the 1<sup>st</sup> September. The service is run by Warwickshire County Council (WCC) but Stratford on Avon District Council will pay £120k to ensure that the service remains for residents who cannot use public transport because of mobility issues or have limited or no public transport.



Home Energy Grants: Residents who do not use gas to heat their home, have a household income of under £36,000 a year, regardless of any savings, and have an EPC for their home of D, E, F or G can apply for a Home Energy Grant through Act on Energy. Call 0800 988 2881.

**Newsletter**: The District Council have a new online newsletter 'The Online View'. Residents can sign up to for information on the website.

**Station Road:** Damage done by lorries entering Station Road (a 'No Through Road') has been reported to the County Council and a sign requested.

**Three Tuns:** We have been in regular touch with the planning officers at the District Council about the Three Tuns. A condition of the planning permission is that work has to start by the 7th September or the permission will fail. Officers have offered to advise the architect/owner.

**15 High Street:** The state of the building and outhouses behind 15 High Street backing on to the Tuery have been reported to the Conservation team at the District Council.

"Thank you so much, that is amazing, we will really be able to go to town now with summer plants & Xmas Decorations. I'm sure all our residents will be very grateful."







#### **HEDGES**



A common source of complaints to the Town Council at this time of the year, are overgrown hedges and trees blocking the pavement. If any part of your hedge borders a pavement or footpath, it is YOUR responsibility to keep it maintained and trimmed back to the point that it doesn't encroach over the pavement or risk injury to passers-by.

**August to March** is often the best time to trim your hedges before the birds start to nest and while there are still no new leaves. You should then not cut hedges from March onwards until the following autumn when chicks have left the nest.

#### COUNCILLORS VISIT ST NICHOLAS CHURCH

In July, eight members of Alcester Town Council and the Clerk, Vanessa Lowe, enjoyed a visit to St Nicholas Church. This was at the invitation of the Friends of the church and they were given a guided tour by the Chair, David Moulson.

Following a change in legislation under the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill passed by Parliament last December and new guidance from the National Association of Local Councils, town and parish councils are now allowed to contribute towards the care and maintenance of churches. This reversed an Act of 1894 when life was different, more people went to church and fundraising was easier.

In view of this, the Councillors wanted to inform themselves of the heritage aspects of this Grade 11\* listed building, which occupies such a prominent position in the town, and of its contents such as the nationally important painted Benefaction Board made in 1632, the superb 17<sup>th</sup> century carved alabaster tomb of Fulke Greville, the stained-glass windows and Queen Anne Library cupboard.

Katie Cross, the Rector, also came and was able to explain to the Councillors that the church receives no funding from the Church of England and has to raise all the money required to maintain and repair the building and contents from, mostly, local sources. Katie also told them of the important work that the church carries out to support the community such as the Food Bank in addition to regular services and christenings, weddings and funerals.

The town can be rightly proud of this historic building and contents, which are much admired by its many visitors, and, hopefully through its Councillors, will be prepared to help look after it for future generations.
