MAYOR'S MESSAGE

It's hard to believe that summer has almost gone and autumn is nearly upon us. Having just been appointed as your Mayor when the last newsletter was published, I find myself nearly six months into the role already - little did I realise how quickly the time would pass. The summer has been a busy time for Lesley (my wife and Consort) and I. The Mayor is Chair of the Town Council for their year in office, but the primary role is representing Alcester at a range of very different events. These include neighbouring councils' formal civic engagements and charity fund-raising events, but my priority is, and will always be, attending and supporting events in our town. The following are a few highlights we have been privileged to enjoy during our time in office so far.



The Alcester Branch of the Royal British Legion has delivered a number of events this year, including VE Day, Armed Forces Day, and VJ Day. It has been a real honour to be invited to support these events.

June saw the opening of Alcester's temporary Banking Hub in the Greig Hall and the launch of the Neurodivergent Friendly Town project (more on these later in the newsletter). At the end of June, the Deputy Mayor, Cllr Gill Forman and I, along with our Consorts, attended Alcester Town Football Club's annual tournament to present trophies and medals. Lesley and I were also honoured to attend the service at Coventry Cathedral to celebrate the installation of the new Bishop of Coventry.

July was a memorable month, with the Mayor's Civic Service taking place in St. Nicholas Church. All present were spellbound by a piano recital given to us by Samuel Harper-Mills, an extremely talented pupil from Alcester Grammar School. Later in the month, Lesley and I were invited to celebrate a graduation ceremony at the University of Warwick.



We have also held our first fund-raising event for our nominated charity, Alcester Day Care, which took the form of a quiz night. We successfully raised a significant sum of money to get us started. A big thank you to all who made it happen and those who came along and donated their money to this wonderful cause.

I also had the pleasure of starting our annual Duck Race along with the Court



The following week, we had a tour of the Ragley Estate during National Open Farm Day and then dashed back to Alcester to judge the Fancy Dress competition at the Annual Court Leet Street Market.

By the time you read this newsletter we will have commenced the launch of 100 coffee mornings due to run through to April 2027, to support Alcester Day Care. STRATFORD ON AVON DISTRICT COUNCILLORS



<u>Local Government Reorganisation</u> – The District Council's public engagement on the preferred option for Local Government Reorganisation will be open from 7th August - 12th September. Details and information are on the District Council's website.

<u>Stratford-on-Avon District Council App</u> - A reminder to residents to download the District Council app, to get up to date news, councillor details, waste collection updates and other useful information.



<u>Warm Homes Local Grant</u> - is a Government funding scheme for local residents and replaces the previous Home Upgrade Grant 2 (HUG2) scheme. The grants are to enable lower income households or those in hard-to-heat properties to keep their homes warm and reduce the costs of energy bills. Unfortunately, the Government funding was reduced from previous levels, so SDC has agreed to top-up the funding. Please email advice@actonenergy.org.uk or Tel: 0800 988 2881 for more information.

<u>Three Tuns</u> – Although Cllr Juned has supported with this for many years, since being elected, Cllr Ballinger has been in regular contact with officers at the District Council to find a resolution for this long pressing local matter. The Enforcement Team in the District Council have also been involved in trying to find a solution, which they continue to do. ALCESTER LEADS THE WAY WITH NEURODIVERGENT FRIENDLY TOWN INITIATIVE

Alcester is taking bold and compassionate steps to become one of the UK's first *Neurodivergent Friendly Towns*, and the community is already feeling the impact. The **Neurodivergent Friendly Town Initiative**, launched in partnership with local organisations and neurodivergent families, aims to create an inclusive environment for people with autism, ADHD, dyslexia, dyspraxia, and other neurological differences.



The initiative includes the creation of a film to use for staff training in local shops and businesses and the promotion of sensory-friendly spaces, clear signage, and quiet areas. These small adjustments can make a huge difference for those who experience the world in a different way. Neurodivergent individuals and their families have had direct input into shaping the town's approach, ensuring it's not just *for* the community,



but with it. Local schools are also onboard, helping to build understanding and awareness from an early age. The response has been overwhelmingly positive. Alcester's shops, cafes, and public services are coming together to break down barriers and embrace diversity. It's not just about accessibility; it's about acceptance and celebration. Alcester is showing that when a town listens, learns, and leads with empathy, it becomes better for everyone. Alcester's example is hoping to inspire nearby towns and villages to consider similar initiatives, proving that change is possible when people work together with empathy and intention. WARWICKSHIRE LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION - YOUR VIEWS MATTER

Central Government plans to restructure local government. It aims to remove the current two-tiers of county, district and borough councils and replace them with a single tier of councils; called unitary councils. Four of the five local borough and district councils across Warwickshire, including Stratford District Council, have united to reach a preferred option: to split the county in half with a single council in the north and a single council in the south of Warwickshire. The map below shows the districts' preferred option for local government reorganisation in Warwickshire.

Local councils and the services they provide have an impact on residents' lives, and it is important that you have a say on possible changes to how these services are delivered in the future. There is an engagement

document ('Shaping the future of our Councils') available online (https://shapingourcouncils.co.uk/get-involved/), which provides further details about the proposals.

Feedback is being sought from residents in the form of a short questionnaire which is available by clicking 'Take part in the consultation' online at the above website address. Hard copies of the questionnaire are also available at the Alcester Library on Priory Road, or from the Town Council's offices (behind the library). This public engagement exercise is running until **Sunday 14 September**.

Once the results have been analysed, the district and borough councils will submit their final local government reorganisation proposal to Central Government on 28 November 2025. We will continue to keep you updated on devolution and local government reorganisation via Alcester Town Council's website - www.alcester-tc.gov.uk, the quarterly newsletter and our social media platforms.

- "...thank you for all the time and effort you put into it, you will never understand just how much it means to myself and my mom to have us together just once a year at the seaside...."





THE GREEN PAGE – CARING FOR OUR ENVIRONMENT

NATURAL FLOOD MANAGEMENT (NFM)

Warwickshire Wildlife Trust is managing a NFM project which is underway between Studley and Alcester. In brief, this involves river restoration and floodplain enhancement using natural flood management techniques

to slow the flow, such as large woody debris structures, shallow banks, inlet expansion and floodplain excavations. This is expected to be completed before the end of 2026. These are small but important steps to help alleviate flood risk in Alcester.

Additional funding is being sought for a much wider project to further support reducing flood risk in Alcester, Kings Coughton, Oversley Green, Great Alne and Henley in Arden. If funding is obtained, this would add to the existing flood defences in and around Alcester.

BE FLOOD READY

Alcester is a resilient and historic town - and while flooding isn't a threat across the whole of Alcester, certain areas, particularly near the rivers, face real and recurring risks. If you live or work in one of these flood risk zones, the message is clear: being flood ready isn't optional - it's essential.

Individual property protection remains a critical obligation for homeowners. What You Can Do If You're at Risk:

- Check your long-term flood risk from rivers and surface water by using the Check Long Term Flood Risk Service: https://www.gov.uk/check-long-term-flood-risk
- Sign up for Environment Agency flood warnings and alerts via https://www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings
- Sign up for MET Office weather warnings https://service.govdelivery.com/accounts/UKMETOFFICE/subscriber/new
- Prepare a household flood plan: to stay safe, protect key documents, elevate possessions, and stock emergency essentials like torches and bottled water. Examples of personal flood plans are available online e.g. https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/personal-flood-plan
- You can also find out if river levels are rising upstream on the River Arrow via https://check-for-flooding.service.gov.uk/

REMEMBER: Not every part of Alcester is at risk of flooding. But if you're in a vulnerable area, your preparedness could protect your property and help safeguard the wider community. Flood resilience starts with informed residents and ends with a stronger town.

RIVER ARROW & ALNE REVIVAL PROJECT

Following a successful funding application from Stratford District Council's Community Climate and Nature Fund, a new project will soon be launched by a volunteer group known as the River Arrow & Alne Revival (RAAR). RAAR will lead community action on river restoration in Alcester, starting with a specific project near Gunnings Bridge on the River Arrow. There are two main elements to the project, running from autumn 2025 to summer 2026, weather permitting:



- 1. **Removal of Himalayan balsam** as described by the Wildlife Trusts, it is "an invasive weed of riverbanks and ditches, where it prevents native species from growing." Its shallow roots reduce bank stability, and its explosive seed pods spread the plant downstream. Correct removal will help native species recover, improve bank resilience, and create additional capacity for flood water.
- 2. **Green engineering to stabilise bare earth** where Himalayan balsam has been removed near Gunnings Bridge, bare ground has been left vulnerable to erosion. RAAR intends to plant native wetland species in these areas to help stabilise the soil, slow water flow, and support biodiversity by improving water quality and habitat structure.

The project will also create opportunities for community engagement. Planned activities include creative nature-based workshops, educational sessions for schools, and collaborations with wellbeing organisations to support mental and physical health through outdoor activity. There is already strong local interest, and no specialist skills are needed to join in. If you would like to learn more or volunteer, please contact administration@alcester-tc.gov.uk.

On August 15th, 103 people received awards at the first Warwickshire ChangeMakers Awards in Warwick to recognise unsung heroes and frontline champions. The event was hosted by The High Sheriff of Warwickshire, Karen Lynch MBE. The county's Mayors (including the



Deputy Mayor of Alcester, Cllr Gill Forman and her Consort, Mr Tim Forman), Lord Lieutenant of Warwickshire, Civic Leaders and the community joined the day, featuring an awards ceremony at St Mary's Church, followed by a procession through town and a garden party at Warwick Castle.

Congratulations to three volunteers from Alcester, Becky Gribben, Bill Goodall and Beth Clarke, who all received a prestigious ChangeMakers award from The High Sherriff, having been nominated by the Town Council.

ALCESTER MOP FAIR


