STRATFORD ON AVON DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

Community Grant Scheme - Stratford on Avon District Council has recently announced its Community Grant Scheme 2025 to allow Town and Parish Councils, charities and community groups to apply for a share of £350,000 to support community assets such as community centres, village halls, parks and recreation areas, and outdoor spaces following the 80th anniversary year of VE and VJ day. Deadlines for applications are 31st January for Small Grants and 27th February for Large Grants.

<u>Climate Change and Nature Fund</u> - Alcester Town Council has been awarded £10,000 as part of the Climate Change and Nature Fund. It was a positive application, and we look forward to seeing the results. <u>Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)</u> - 15 projects have been recommended for support, including contributions to natural flood management in Alcester and support for Alcester Academy.

Three Tuns (Cllr Tom Ballinger) - Since my by-election win in May 2025, I've taken my role as District Councillor extremely seriously. The state of The Three Tuns has been top of my list to get sorted for my residents and the town - it has been an eyesore for many years and totally unacceptable.

I've had concerns about potential health and safety issues and weed growth. Following conversations with officers in SDC and myself, the weeds have now been cut back.

Officers are working closely with the new owners on their short-term and long-term plans for the site. I look forward to seeing what the new owners will do, as this is an important building for the town. 

ALCESTER DAY CARE – THE MAYOR'S NOMINATED CHARITY 2025-2027

So far this year, fundraising for a new day care centre for people with dementia and their carers has reached more than £4,000 in a little over two months from coffee mornings alone.

Councillor David Henderson's call for 100 'coffee and cake mornings' during his year as the Mayor of Alcester, has been taken up with enthusiasm. Ten events have already been held at locations including Great Alne Park, Jubilee Court and Alcester Academy with more to follow.

The Mayor commented, "The response from the Alcester community has been fantastic, and we're confident we'll raise even more."

Plans for the new Day Care Centre involve refurbishing and

extending Orchard House near the Greig Leisure Centre on Kinwarton Road, at an estimated cost of £800,000. It will offer customised facilities to help those with dementia and their loved ones. Currently, the day centre operates three days a week at the Baptist Church in Henley Street. People with dementia are looked after by staff, while carers take a well-deserved break.

Councillor Henderson jointly hosted a Cocktail Masterclass in November with the Earl of Yarmouth and St Maur. The fundraising campaign has future plans for a quiz night and a Burns Night supper in January. And next year's mayor, Councillor Gill Forman, has promised to carry on the campaign as her designated Mayor's Charity when she takes on the office of Mayor in 2026.

Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan Review

Pre-Submission Consultation: 15 December 2025 - 30 January 2026

Introduction

The Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan was adopted in July 2021. It is subject to a review every 5 years. The Plan contains planning policies which are important to the local community and which the planning authority take into account when deciding on planning applications.

The decision to undertake a review of the Plan was publicised in September 2023. In January 2024 a Steering Committee was formed comprising residents, business and community organisation representatives, and Town Councillors. That Committee has reviewed the exiting Plan and proposed changes. Some of these changes update the Plan to align with updates to higher level plans and references to other documents. There are also some changes to existing policies. The version of the Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan showing all the highlighted changes, and a clean version can be found on the relevant Town Council website page using the QR code here: —

PROPOSED CHANGES TO POLICIES

HOUSING AND THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Policy HBE 1 – Residential development within the Built Up Area Boundary – AMENDED A Housing Survey indicated that affordable housing is in short supply so it is proposed to add to

A Housing Survey indicated that affordable housing is in short supply so it is proposed to add to this policy a statement that the use of small sites to address this shortfall would be encouraged.

Policy HBE 5 - Specialist accommodation - DELETED

It is proposed to delete this policy. Since the existing Plan was made some specialist accommodation has been built. Deleting the policy does not mean that applications for new specialist accommodation will not be supported but each application would be considered on its merits and against compliance with other plan policies.

Policy HBE 6 - Healthy living - DELETED

It is proposed to delete this policy which aims to ensure all developments protect occupants' health. These requirements are now covered by other planning provisions and building regulations.

Policy HBE7 - Electric car charging points - DELETED

This policy requires all new houses to have charging points. It is proposed to delete this policy which has been superseded by higher level policies which require charging points.

Policy HBE 9 - Public realm - AMENDED

This policy seeks to make public areas more attractive. A new proposed requirement is that all development proposals will be expected to demonstrate how design has been influenced by the need to plan positively to minimise crime. Developers should achieve Secured By Design silver level certification.

Another proposed change to this policy adds that public realm includes street furniture such as litter and dog bins, benches and noticeboards. Recent experience of new build developments has shown the need for this change.

ECONOMY

Policy EC 1 - Development with the Town Centre - AMENDED

This policy supports development which enhances and supports the vitality of the Town Centre. An addition to the policy is proposed to state a preference for reusing existing commercial premises. This is to retain a compact, sustainable and attractive Town Centre.

It is often difficult to find a parking space in the Town Centre so it is also proposed to support additional parking provision and improved signage.

Policy EC 3 - Supporting business start-up - PART DELETED

It is proposed to delete the part of the policy which refers to supporting residential developments which include specific home office space. This is no longer required; working from home is now more common-place and residents use suitable space if they have no home office.

Policy EC 4 – Employment land changes of use and mixed use development – AMENDED

This policy supports changes in employment use to provide a mix of employment and residential. The proposal is to add that such support will be provided only if the residential part is secondary. This is to ensure that employment stays the major use of the site.

Policy EC 5 – Support for commercial development -AMENDED

This policy supports commercial development that demonstrates direct benefits to the area and promote the use of local workforce and products. The policy states that adequate parking should be provided. To reduce car journeys it is proposed to add to this policy that retail development outside the Town Centre should be accessible by footpaths, cycle ways and public transport.

Policy EC 6 – Education and childcare provision – AMENDED

This policy supports development proposals for new or extensions to education and childcare facilities. To reduce car journeys and parking issues it is proposed to add to this policy that such developments should be accessible by appropriate public transport.

Policy EC 7 – Further and adult education and training – AMENDED

This policy supports the development of further and adult education facilities and requires them to be accessible by footpath and cycle ways. To reduce car journeys and parking issues it is proposed to add that new facilities should be accessible by public transport.

TRANSPORT AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Policy TI 1 – New development and connectivity – AMENDED

This policy requires residential developments of ten or more units to provide connectivity to existing public networks. It is proposed to extend the policy to commercial development.

Policy TI2 - Telecommunication - AMENDED

This policy supports new and enhanced telecommunications development subject to certain factors. It is proposed is to add that there is a preference for underground cabling, which is less obtrusive and does not require poles, rather than overhead cabling.

Policy TI3 – High speed broadband – DELETE

This policy requires all new development to include high speed broadband. It is proposed that this is deleted because Alcester now has superfast broadband.

COMMUNITY, LEISURE AND WELL-BEING

Policy CLW 1 – Community and leisure facilities development – AMENDED

This policy supports development proposals which improve existing community or leisure facilities. A list of the existing facilities in the neighbourhood area has been added for clarification. It includes sporting facilities, play areas, and community buildings.

Policy CLW2 – Enhancing access to and utilisation of open green spaces – AMENDED

It is proposed to add that access consideration should be given to cyclists – currently it only mentions wheelchair user and pedestrians.

Since the existing plan was made access to Oversley Wood has been limited by the Forestry Commission, so it is added as a space that access to would be supported.

Policy CLW 3 - Health provision – AMENDED

This policy supports any development that creates or enhances facilities for mental or physical health provision. It is proposed to add that any such development must be in an accessible location.

Policy CLW 4 – Allotments and growing spaces – AMENDED

Part of this policy states that any development that would result in the loss of an existing allotment space would not be supported. It is proposed to delete this because under Policy NE3, below, existing allotments have been added as Local Green Spaces which will give them greater protection. The second part of the policy supporting new allotments will be retained.

NATURAL ENVIRONMENT

Policy NE 2 – Biodiversity – AMENDED

This policy supports developments that minimise impact on biodiversity and provide net gains, but the policy does not set a minimum. It is proposed to add that development, unless exempt, will not be supported unless it provides at least 10% net gain and above that level will be encouraged where possible.

Policy NE 3 – Local Green Spaces – AMENDED

It is proposed that the following additional sites, which are well used by residents, are made Local Green Spaces.

ALCESTER FOOD FESTIVAL GRANT SCHEME SUPPORTS LOCAL GOOD CAUSES

OVERSLEY GREEN RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

Do you know a wheelchair user who would love to explore Oversley Woods?

A recent post in the OGRAnet WhatsApp group brought attention to a troubling incident: a wheelchair user became trapped inside the western gate of the woods. Since the closure of the car park, both entrances have been secured with metal gates that unfortunately restrict wheelchair access. The individual had entered via Exhall, where access remains possible, but was unable to exit through the western gate. Thankfully, a member of the group knew the padlock code and was able to arrange a quick, safe release. The incident, however, has highlighted a broader issue - how to ensure inclusive access to one of our most beautiful natural spaces. Forestry England has responded by confirming that while both gates are padlocked, they are willing to share the code for the western gate with registered disabled visitors. The outdoor exercise gave everyone a healthy appetite for cakes and hot drinks back at Rotary's Support Centre afterwards!


